WELL WATER DEADLY

Medical Health Officer Hall says that nearly all of the cases of scarlet fever in this city have their origin in people using water from wells.

In his report to the Board of Health yesterday, he stated that nearly all the cases of scarlet fever during the past year had been traced to this source. The danger of using well water has been repeatedly pointed out by Dr. Hall, and he advises that steps be taken to have waterworks services installed all over the city, and that the disease-producing wells be filled in.

IMPORTANT DECISION

In the suit of Heintzman Piano Company vs. Cottrell, tried before Judge Bell in December last, the Judge to-day handed down his decision.

Judgment is directed to be entered for the plaintiffs for \$412.50 and costs of suit.

The defendant gave the plaintiffs an order for a piano, under seal, and the next day telegraphed cancelling it. In the meantime the plaintiff had shipped the piano and notified the defendant that they would hold him to his contract. The defendant contended that he had the right to revoke his order at any time before notice of acceptance was given to him by the company.

Judge Bell finds on the law that the plaintiffs are right and that the defendants could not revoke his order.

This leaves the defendant with two pianos on his hands, as immediately after revoking the first order he bought a Nordheimer.
