Disastrous Fires at Halifax.

Halifax has been visited by two serious fires, one on Thursday afternoon during the terrible gale, which caused a loss of \$311,000, insurance caused one half, and again on Monday, when another fire started a little before one o'clock a. m. Both fires were on the water front. It took the combined fire fighting forces of the Halifax fire department under chief Broderick, the military and navy, with a contingent from Dartmouth, and two water boats to stop the fire on Thursday, and now the prominent citizens are urging the City authorities to provide a good fire boat for service at such fires. Such a steamer would lend valuable aid, and the Alderman who refuses to promote the scheme may suffer decapitation when the elections take place.
