### Comments.

A remarkable address was given in St. James Square Presbyterian Church, Toronto, a week ago by Dr. Harry Gratton Guinness, in which the doctor gave a graphic account of life in the Congo. He strikingly contrasted the conditions as he observed them on two trips through the Congo some twenty years apart, and showed how the barbarism and primordial savagery of the natives had disappeared under the influence of Christianity, uplifting the people and giving them civilized ideals and ambitions, and the natives were proving of becoming a very intelligent and industrious civilization. The need for more missionary work was urgent.

The Moody Colportage Association was founded by D. L. Moody in 1894. The library books sold during 1910 was 288,650 copies; the number of the emphasized gospel of John published in 1910 was 100,000; fifty states and sixty foreign countries have made up the field in which the Association has operated; 1,600,027 bibles and testaments have been published; 1,400,000 gospels of John, 2,613,338 tracts, 376,834 revival hymns, 201,480 famous hymns, thousands and hundreds of thousands of other bible booklets have been distributed. Thousands of copies of the bible have been distributed free to prisoners of the United States and Canada, 20,000 sent to India for free distribution, and everywhere the cry is for the bible. The popularity increases as the years go by in all countries and in all tongues.

Surely Satan is losing something of his past cunning when he sends forth a mass of sassy writers to attack the bible, and scatter so far as possible, the seeds of infidelity amongst the thoughtful and amongst the children of our land. Our fathers and mothers, the saints of old, and the hosts of believers whose lives have testified to the influence of the old book, must have been a pack of fools, if the ardent nonsense some of these critics of the bible write were true. ly she moved over the high road, certain speaker would speak in Tremont Temple, Boston, of a Sunday afternoon upon 'My mother's bible.' It was one of the most impressive services ever held in Boston as this speaker talked of and for the old 'mother's bible,' and one of these chaps with the 'modern messes' and the painter, unbelieving face, would hardly have dared to get up on that great occasion and have said a word against 'The mother's bible.' They use the other method.

Some of these 'modern men' don't know what they believe because they really believe nothing, and talk it, and their sayings become ad nauseam, providing you read their simple sayings. They take it upon themselves to adjust the scriptures, they say what was, and what is all of which is a mass of lies manufactured by themselves and their Society or Bureau, oblivious of the fact that people generally see right through the game.

### Four Room Houses \$1 a Year.

The Rev. J. F. Dickie, pastor of the American Church in Berlin, when in Augsburg, Germany, a few weeks ago found a little city in the heart of the city that was shut in all by itself with two gates and is called the 'Fuggerei.' It is so called because the 106 houses within it were all built with money left by Fuggerei, the wealthy sixteenth century banker. When he died he directed that these houses should be built and then given to poor aged families for 4 marks and 12 pennings rental a year, that is exactly one American dollar. They have four rooms and kitchen, with a little front garden behind.—Christina Her

### Right Living.

The energetic measures that have been carried on for many years by numerous temperance societies to abolish the evils of alcoholic excess and the movement that has recently been started to combat the ravages of tuberculosis, are not, after all, ends in themselves, but are really branches of a movement that has for its end the good health of each and every individual.

Our ideas in regard to disease and health have changed. In the old time it was believed that disease was sent from God as a punishment. An illustration of this belief is found in a sermon preached by Timothy Dwight, a former president of Yale University, shortly after the introduction of vaccination, in which he earnestly exhorted to prevent men dying of smallpox if God so decreed. To-day it is becoming more and more understood that disease comes by violation to the laws of nature, and efforts are now made to prevent disease by removing the cause and living in a hygienic way amidst wholesome surroundings.

The value of fresh air, sunshine, proper food, mastication, play, exercise, moderation, and kind thoughts is becoming better understood. And more attention is probably given to the support of good health than ever before. To prove this it is only necessary to walk along the street at night and observe the number of windows that are left open. Only a few years ago all were tightly closed, the night air was 'bad.' It will be only a few more years before the windows of every sleeping apartment will be left open summer and winter. And once the habit is acquired it will remain.

Although the world moves surely toward the light it moves slowly, and there is yet much educational, legislative and executive work needed before the good health of each and every individual is secured. Neither course is, however, what it should be, and efforts should be made to improve and lengthen them as well as introduce other studies and exercises to teach the child how to become a good animal. This change will be made at the expense of some of the purely scholastic subjects now taught which are distasteful to the children and forgotten as soon as school days are over. In order to have in Canada a strong and self-reliant people it is of most importance that they know how to live physically. 'Become a good animal; the rest follows.' is the way Herbert Spencer expresses it.
