Melba, she came to this country three years ago, with very little head-start, and last season, with the exception of a few minor engagements, she was the foremost place among the prima donnas of the Boston Opera Company.

A telegram from Laredo, Texas, conveyed to friends in Wolfville this week the sad news of the death of Mrs. Grover C. Nye, formerly Miss Evelyn Thorne Bishop, of this town, who died in the hospital at Laredo, May 13th, after an illness of eight weeks. Beside her husband and little daughter, aged two years, the deceased leaves, in Laredo, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. G. Bishop, and in Wolfville her grandmother, Mrs. Julia Bishop, and aunt, Miss Ernie Bishop, all of whom have the profound sympathy of many friends in their irreparable loss. Mr. and Mrs. Nye visited Wolfville three years ago, shortly after their marriage, and the latter's parents then moved from Wolfville to Laredo to be near their daughter. Mrs. Nye was a music pupil at Acadia Seminary and after her graduation went to Laredo to engage in teaching. Her marriage with Mr. Nye soon followed. Further particulars as to her death are expected by her friends here next week.

Legislature Prorogue.

The Nova Scotia Legislature is prorogue on Tuesday afternoon. The session lasted 13 weeks less two days. The opposition made a much more vigorous fight than ever before. "Noted" members disposed of were the so-called Robert Bills regarding the Halifax Electric Tramway in which Mr. Robert audited two reverses, though his third bill, now through the house, is a partial success for him. A great deal of interest centered round the amendments of the public utilities act which as a whole has been made substantially favorable to Robert's original proposal by the government.

The opposition made sharp charges against the management of the government farm at Truro; the investigation resulted in the bringing in of majority and minority reports.
