The red raspberries in particular do not need to be headed back very much.

CUT RASBERRY CANES

five or six feet all these tall canes can be cut back to a four foot level. This should be done before growth starts.

With the black and purple raspberries it is best to cut off the new shoots when they are about two and a half or three feet high so that they will branch and throw main laterals. In the Spring they should be cut back to four feet if they have grown

While Spring is the best time to set out raspberry plants, there is no reason why you shouldn't make a new plantation from stock in your own garden during the late Fall. This is also a good time to provide supports for the plants. Some growers like to tie each plant to a stake, but that requires considerable labor. The simplest plan is to set a post at the end of each row, surmounting it with a cross piece in the form of a T. Then a single wire can be strung each side of each row, holdin the plants upright even when they are loaded with frui', and making it much easier to pick the berries.
