THE MARKET BY-LAW.

In some instances potatoes, butter, etc., can be purchased at a lower price in the stores that on the market. Then why not after this by law! which alone is not very detripenta to our bujers interests, who pay large taxes into our own treasury, but assisis pay large taxes into the oververy materially in deterring numbers of farmers and their wives from coming to town at such hours as would allow them to dispose of their respec ive small goods to whoever will be and allow them to return to their homes in good time, instead of holding them here for hours without the slightest necessity, only to sat'sfy
the greed and curiosity of g few who
could be at the market as early as any buyer.

But while on this matter we do not intend to

go so far as some of the council, for we cannot se how the present by law can be altered or done away with in toto all at once, therefore we would suggest that Saturday's rules be left as the law now stands, this being the only day in the week ow stands, this being the only day in the week ousekeepers appear to turn out in fail force. We are of opinion that a gross injustice has

been perpetrated on our buyers, dealers and store keepers, for the pleasure and luxury of a few in dividuals, who probably have never by either of terprise or industry assisted the town of Guelfi my great extent.
