ICE BOATS.—The first ice boat of the season crossed from Cape Tormentine to Cape Traverse on Tuesday. She carried 5 passengers. This is probably the latest date on record for the first trip to be made.

At the Choir Concert to-morrow evening Miss Lander will give the position scene from *Romance and Juliet* which created such enthusiasm at Amherst last year. Reserved seats are rapidly filling up.

BAND CONCERT.—The 8th Cavalry Band are perfecting arrangements for a military concert to be given in Music Hall next month. Besides the usual features introduced by the band, there will be exhibitions of sword work, fencing and the single stick exercises by the members of the band. Alfred Markham, Jr. of the 8th Cavalry, St. John is expected to take part. Fuller announcements will be made later.

HOMER FOR INTERMENT.—The body of Robert O'Brien, son of the late Michael O'Brien, Esq., of Fort Lawrence, who died in Boston on the 30th, arrived on Tuesday evening and was interred on Wednesday afternoon in the cemetery at Amherst Point beside his parents. Deceased was 28 years of age and occupied a responsible position as conductor on the Metropolitan several years and was to within a week of his death. The bereaved have the sympathy of the community with them in their affliction.

MISSIONARY CONCERT.—The members of the Young Peoples Society gave a most interesting concert on Sunday evening. The programme consisted of reading of well prepared papers and recitations giving a brief but comprehensive sketch of the Grand League Mission, together with suitable recitations and singing. This society is growing rapidly, and its weekly meetings are always full of instructive material.

SECOND.—The second lecture on the musical course was delivered by Prof. W. W. Andrews on Saturday evening. Subject, Sound. The lecturer illustrated his remarks with experiments, with Syren, Singing Flame, etc., with the aid of a fine Oxy-Ether light recently added to the Laboratory.

ACCIDENT.—On Friday afternoon Capt. Wilson Estabrooks had a narrow escape from death while at work on his vessel, the Crown Prince. The schooner has been laid up all winter and a great mass of ice, probably 10 tons, had frozen itself to the sides. Capt. Estabrooks was at work on the outside of the hull when suddenly the mass fell, a portion striking him in his chest and rendering him unconscious. He was alone at the time and not having time to get to the side, he was thrown overboard. Two ribs were found to be broken and the captain was otherwise shaken up.

Arthur Marks, son of Thomas Marks, of Middle Sackville was struck over the eye on Monday, by the shaft of a passing sleigh and was badly cut. The eyesight will not be permanently injured.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Josiah Wood, M. P. is confined to his house through an attack of pneumonia. He is doing as well as can be expected and is not considered dangerously ill.

—Rev. F. W. and Mrs. Harrison are recovering from their recent attack of La Grippe and his friends hope to be able to see Mr. Harrison in the pulpit in the near future.

—Mr. Frank Morice, who has been seriously ill for some weeks past, is slowly recovering.

—Mr. J. E. E. Dickson, general agent of the Union Assurance Society, was in town yesterday in the interests of that company.

Local Matters.

Samuel Macneil captured a black fox at Shilole the other day.

Mrs. Arnold Hatfield, of Port George, N. S. fell on the ice at that place on Monday night, breaking her left arm.—Mrs. John Reick fell on the sidewalk at Parrsboro, N. S., last Friday evening and injured herself so badly that she has not been able to walk since. It was thought at first that her hip bone was broken, but it is now believed that no fracture has been sustained.

A correspondent from River Hebert, N. S., a week ago, reported the death by accident of Joseph Porter. On Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Porter, the widow, appeared to be sleeping as usual, but those in the house becoming alarmed at her sleeping so long, tried to awaken her, when it was found that she had passed away in her sleep. This makes six deaths in River Hebert in ten days.

Peter Landry, a youth of 14 was yesterday sentenced to one month's imprisonment for having maliciously stabbed another youth, Charles Cook, with a butcher's knife on the evening of Friday last. The two youths were having a snowball fight, when Landry lost his temper, went into the house, returning with the knife Landry stabbed him in the thigh, inflicting a deep wound over an inch long (Amherst Ex.)

Measles are reported to be very prevalent in some of the country districts. At Berry's Mills the school has been closed for some time past on account of the prevalence of the disease, but has now reopened again. At Lakes Mountain the school was closed down on Thursday on the same account. The disease is confined principally to the children, though some grown up people are ill with the malady. No deaths have occurred in these sections so far from this disease.

Amherst Press: R. B. Chapman, of this town, has been the recipient of a valuable and very pretty curiosity from the Christian Herald, in the shape of a piece of Olive wood, brought by Dr. Talmage from Jerusalem, and presented to the above gentleman, as a token of his personal appreciation of the kind interest he has manifested in the magazine. It is a handsome specimen of the olive wood, the grain of wood showing up very prettily.

Mrs. Alexander Stewart, the oldest resident of Amherst died there on Wednesday 10th inst, at the residence of her son-in-law, Hon. Senator Dickson. Mrs. Stewart was born June 10, 1792, and was therefore nearly a century old. She married 76 years ago Alex. Stewart, afterward, Hon. Alex. Stewart, Master of the Rolls for Nova Scotia who died 27 years ago. The funeral took place on Saturday, and was largely attended. Among her surviving descendants are:

Col. C. J. Stewart and Mrs. Clarke (Colonel) Halifax; Mrs. Dickey (Senator) Amherst; Mrs. Bliss (Rev. D. M.) Westmorland. The late Mrs. Townsend, wife of Rev. Canon Townsend, was her eldest daughter.

David Belmont has just sold the schooner Elmo and James Arthur. Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm McLeod, of Gulf shore, celebrated their golden wedding this week. A set of easy chairs was presented to the aged couple by their guests, in addition to the usual presents made of the most precious metal.—Thomas Jones, one of our oldest inhabitants, has passed away. Mr. Jones was a native of London, England, and was 82 years of age. Capt. Gambol, of the Salvation Army, has left Pugwash, and Capt. Rothenow is now in charge of the corps here.—Hon. Pugh and Co.

A travelling agent writes that he saw a very sad case when he discovered a young man who had just buried his wife and was returning to Moncton from placing his motherless children in the care of a sister in another town was in company with another young gentleman from Moncton, who was taking his sister's corpse to Prince Edward Island for interment in the family burial ground. At the station they saw an ominous looking box, which enclosed another coffin, and naturally went over to see who it was. Fanny the horror of the Moncton girl yesterday when he discovered by the address, that it was the body of his own mother, and this was the first intimation he had of her sudden and unexpected death. BAIE VERTE.

—The Bayfield Orchestra under the leadership of Prof. Gordon gave a grand musical entertainment in Temperance Hall on Thursday evening in behalf of Baie Verte Methodist Church funds, which was well attended, notwithstanding the severe storm.

—The St. John Sun of February 10, contained a letter from the non de plume of "Veritas," in reply to an item in the Post of Jan. 14th, from Baie Verte. This after four weeks reflection the writer appears to have concluded that their correspondent was "greatly exercised at the fact that there is a vendor in the village who deals out the verdict according to Scott Act law and that there were to be found persons who were in accordance with the Scott Act law."

"What we said was that 'Baie Verte Division had succeeded in building up such a wall of protection that intoxicating liquors could not find an entrance to our village except through one hole that the law had forced which is feared is caused with whisky material, and is fast wearing larger as the reeling drunken man can be heard to 'drink my liquor according to law.' Now we would not wish to ascribe our friend's inability to comprehend simple language to a positive over-dose of Scott Act medicine as we would in all clarity remember that some people are usually slow to comprehend. It was not that we found fault with the 'hole' but it was the wretched material which it was used that was so shocking. Surely this writer does not presume to say that reeling drunken men is the legitimate outcome of the Scott Act. Then, 'Veritas' volunteers the information as though we had intimated to the contrary, that Baie Verte had had since the inauguration of the act in this country, one and two vendors besides the long since, two rum holes all running in full blast, and now that these have been reduced to one vendor the most fastidious should be satisfied. He is violently not aware that the 'tasteful' temperance of Baie Verte knew that it is possible for as much liquor to pass through one 'hole' and thus the village, as through a greater number. The purpose is not to allow this one to become any more damaging than is possible. This overthrew and supports in the case of the vendor, it is what we referred to in speaking of the division in building up a wall of protection. And 'Veritas' in closing gives the free advice that certain persons mind their own business. Now what our business is. When young men and old men can be seen on our streets under the influence of liquor obtained from the authorized vendor is not, we ask every loyal citizen to rise in might and suppress this growing evil."

Founded in the Bay.

The following St. John dispatch appeared in yesterday's Herald: Pilot McArthur, who brought in the schooner E. Morrison, Capt. Morrison, from Parrsboro, reports the schooner Franklin in Prince Anthony's Cove. Both schooners sailed from Spencer's Island at 12 o'clock last night. It was fine at the time, but soon afterwards the weather set in, with a heavy sea running. In coming around the Cape this morning the E. Morrison kept in close to Black Point. The Franklin Pierce was sighted close to the shore, and it was seen that her mainmast was blown away. It was also observed that the crew had launched the boat, and old men were seen on shore. The crew of the Merrimack, who was aloft furling the topsails, shouted out that the Pierce was sinking, and a few minutes afterwards she disappeared. Capt. Morrison rounded his vessel to try and render assistance, but it was impossible to put near the shore, owing to the size of his vessel and the heavy sea running. It is probable that the men reached the shore in safety, as the boat was last seen near the wreck of if those on board were rescued, they would be seen. The boat was in Anthony's Cove and not far from the shore. The schooner carried three hands all told. The "Franklin Pierce" was a schooner of 110 tons, and had a cargo of coal for Parks cotton factory. She was a vessel of 57 tons register, and was owned by James Ogilvie of Kingsport, N. S., and his brother.
