As hackmen and the drivers of delivery wagons menace the lives of pedestrians every day, it would be well for the latter to arm themselves with horse whips or revolvers.

There are no further changes in the prices of flour although millers claim that the present cost of wheat is such that they are selling at a loss. There is a good deal of speculation in Chicago and the market prices of wheat are very uncertain. It seems to be almost quite in the hands of speculators who can force prices in such directions as suits their own interests. Oatmeal and cornmeal are unchanged. Beans are firmer and 5 cents per bushel higher. Barley and split peas are higher and are quoted today at \$4 per barrel. Stocks of cheese are limited; singles are quoted at 91 and twins at 10 cents. Cassia and pepper have each advanced 2 cents per pound. New brands of soap are continually appearing in the market. The latest is the "Dishcloth Soap," for which George S. DeForest & Sons are the agents. Each four pound bar is wrapped in a dishcloth and retails for 25 cents. This firm landed on Friday 1024 packages of tea direct from India and China and have 574 more to arrive in a few days. The tea trade is very active.
