### Fifty Years of Progress

Our Jubilee Year.—The year 1919 was notable inasmuch as it completed the first fifty years of the company's active operations, and at the same time marked the year of its greatest development and progress in all departments of its business. Notwithstanding a certain number of abnormal death losses arising from the war and the influenza epidemic, amounting to \$352,857.65, the surplus earnings for the year were \$4,302,801, an increase over the previous year of 60%, and showing earnings of \$34.27 for every \$1,000 of total assets held at the end of

Invested Funds.-Never in the history of Canadian life insurance has there been such a remarkable opportunity for the profitable investment of life insurance funds, and the effect of the past year's investments will be to enhance the surplus earnings over a long period of years, through holding up the average rate of interest carned on the invested funds. For the year 1919 the company earned the very satisfactory rate of 6.39%.
