THE three by-elections for the Provincial Legislature of Ontario held on Wednesday last, were all carried by the Ross Government. This is what the Ottawa Citizen has to say about the matter: "When it is said that the result in the Reform stronghold, North Norfolk, was close, and that the two other constituencies, which had returned Conservatives in the general election, were captured by government supporters by majorities up in the hundreds, the whole story is told. The fate of the Ross administration hung in the balance. It was necessary to its existence that these by-elections should be carried. And they were carriedvery much so. In May last North Perth and North Grey returned Conservatives. Since that nothing has occurred which should incline the feelings of the electorate towards the Ross administration.
