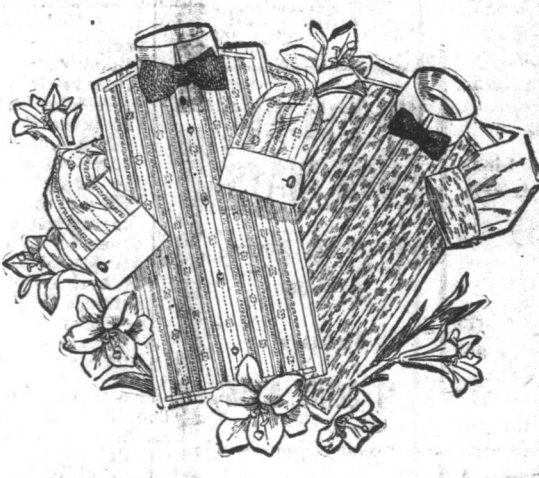

## The Mongolian Arrived Yesterday.

The S. S. Mongolian arrived here at 6 a.m. yesterday from Liverpool, after a run of 9 days.

The ship had fairly good weather out the first part of the voyage, but on making this coast had fog and rain for over two days, and speed, of necessity, had to be slackened but for which she would have had an earlier arrival. She brought 11 bags and 4 baskets of mail and 450 tons cargo, with the following passengers:—Miss J. de Albert, Nurse Bailey, Hon. J. Macpherson; with these passengers in transit to Halifax, 6 saloon, 18 second, 50 steerage; she had 101 passengers all told for the voyage, most of them emigrants and including several men, miners for Stellarton, Springhill, Sydney, and a couple of engineers for Bell Island. The tedious naturally attached to such a voyage was relieved by a series of sports which were held on the decks on Friday and Saturday and which the passengers say were thoroughly enjoyed by all the passengers, saloon as well as steerage. The items were of a character to create unbounded mirth, and several of the saloon and intermediate passengers engaged in laughable competitions. The programme consisted of events such as three-chalking the pig's eye, slinging the monkey, and races such as the needle race, baby feeding race, potato race, bun eating race, a tug-of-war and walking race. Seven pounds stg. were netted for the Sailors Orphanage at Glasgow. Service was held on board Sunday evening at which all the passengers assisted.

After the repast was concluded Mr. M. W. Furlong, V. P. of St. Bonaventure's, presided and introduced the orator of the occasion. He paid him a very high compliment, and said that the better selection could have been made for such an occasion. "The Monsignor, it need hardly be said, amply vindicated Mr. Furlong's high opinion of him, by his address, which was a most learned and interesting address on education covering the whole period of history in a brilliant analytical manner showing the evolution that began in culture and learning among the early pagan nations of China, Persia, Egypt, Greece and Rome culminated in the present advanced state of education according to the doctrines of Christianity. A splendid tribute was paid to the monks of the Middle Ages who laboured under such great difficulties to preserve the learning of the preceding ages. He also eulogized the work of the different religious orders in more modern times on behalf of education, particularly the Irish Christian Brothers who have brought St. Bonaventure's College up to such a high status amongst our educational institutions. He dwelt with emphasis on the impossibility of having real and sound education without religion. St. Bonaventure's College had the honor of sending forth since its foundation men who became eminent in the various walks of life, and would not doubt continue to do so as time went on. It was a source of congratulation to find that at the present time that both the Archbishop and the Premier of the country were both old boys of St. Bonaventure. This address was well received and the celebration would be a success.

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## Big Passenger Traffic.

Yesterday was a big day with the Reid Ndd. Co. and the regular and all other trains, which left for the country were packed with people. The 2.30 train took out 12 well filled cars with people for Manuels and Kelligrews mostly. The first train which arrived last night brought in 700 passengers in 15 cars. Fully 1,700 people left the city and all returned without the slightest accident, a fact which speaks well for the care and efficiency of conductors and engineers.

## Banker Here Leaking.

The banker Minnie Hodder, Capt. Harrison, of Grand Bank, reached here yesterday for repairs and to refit. A couple of days ago the vessel in laboring in the high sea which ran on the Banks began leaking, and made water so rapidly that two pumps had to be kept going on her to keep her afloat. She reports fish scarce and that squid has not yet made its appearance. The vessel has 1,400 qtls. of fish stocked for nine dories.

## The Whale Fishery.

The whaler Hump reached port Tuesday for supplies. She is fishing at Trinity and since going there, less than two weeks ago, has captured 17 fish. She has now 22 for the summer, including the sperm picked up a couple of days ago. This was a fine fish, 65 feet long, and will give a good yield of valuable oil. The Ingraham reports the Hawk at Cape Charles with 4 and the Cachelot at Hawke's Bay with only 5 fish.

## Boy Killed by Car.

Yesterday forenoon Bell Island was the scene of a fatal accident, the victim being a little boy aged 12, son of Sergt. Cox. We understand that the lad was taking a ride on one of the ore cars, from which he accidentally fell as it ran over the tracks. The wheels of the car passed over his prostrate form, he was terribly crushed and cut and died in a very short while. His father and mother are intensely grieved over his untimely death and the sympathy of their many friends both here and on Bell Island will go out to them in their sad bereavement.

## Rifle Club Matches.

Mews won the McGregor challenge medal with a score of 81, and Mr. P. Miles took the Job junior prize with a score of 61. Mr. Mews finished up a good day's work by winning the W. D. Reid challenge cup, his score over the six ranges being 156. The victors in the contests have our congratulations.
