

Sad Drowning

The schooner Bessie T. Capt. Jos. Turner, reached port yesterday afternoon, reporting having lost one of her crew of Cape Bonaville on the way from St. Brendan's, B. B.

The sad affair happened Saturday evening just before dark. The captain being at the wheel decided to reef the foresail before night, as it was very stormy and Capt. Ernest Keele to assist in lowering the sail; as he was in the act of doing so the boom suddenly lifted and in swinging off poor Keele became entangled in the sheet and was drawn over the vessel's side into the sea. There was a big sea running, but the captain made every effort to heave the vessel to, which failed, as she threatened to swamp. Keele was seen in the water once, but it was impossible to launch a boat, as there was a tremendous sea running, and an effort to do so would only entail the loss of more lives. After talking about in the vicinity of the accident for some time, the captain perceiving the work of searching would be fruitless, bore up for Catalina and wired the sad news to the young man's father. The unfortunate young man was only twenty years of age, a fine seaman, and held in great regard by the captain and his fellow-seamen. He was a resident of Alexander Bay, but was engaged at the fishery in St. Brendan's the past season. To the stricken relatives of the deceased, the Telegram extends its deepest sympathy.

Serious Affair on Nascopie.

NEARLY ENDED IN MURDER.

More startling facts have been elicited concerning the sensation that occurred on the S. S. Nascopie recently and to which allusion was made in Saturday's Telegram.

"I'll have someone's life," yelled the Russian Finn as he rushed from the forecastle of the ship, flourishing two weapons with which he did bodily injury. Jeremiah Joy, a sailor, was slashed in the back with a razor, and James Brewin, a stoker, was struck a violent blow of a hammer in the head. From what we can learn there was no cause for the dastardly deeds committed. All the sailors and stokers were in the forward part of the ship spinning yarns. There was no grievance between anybody. The Russian Finn, who was a sailor on board, was in company with the rest of the seamen. Suddenly Brewin was saluted by the Russian in a very unfriendly way. The foreigner used a terrible expression and told Brewin that it was meant for him and the rest of his St. John's gang. Up to this the other seamen did not know of any disagreement. Brewin and the Russian, at the latter's request, took off their outside garments and a fierce encounter ensued. The foreigner is a big burly fellow of unusual physique. The exhibition was a manly one but it only lasted ten minutes as the St. John's man put it all over his opponent. The Russian managed to get clear and ran below to his bunk, seized a razor and a hammer. Again he hastened to the deck bent on doing something desperate, while the two weapons that he flourished, terrorized his shipmates. Jeremiah Joy, a sailor lad, who was making his first voyage, was slashed in the back with the razor. The avenging Russian was not satisfied with that, but later on in the night went into the quarters where Brewin was sleeping and struck him in the head with a hammer and knocked him insensible for several hours. But that Brewin was not asleep at the time and in defending himself took the force of the blow with his hand, there is but little doubt that he would have been killed outright. The left side of Brewin's head near the temple was bulged in and the wonder is that he escaped so well. After laying low a second victim the Russian became even more desperate, but before any more harm was done Captain Meikle, who was given the alarm, went forward armed, took the cowardly fellow into custody and placed him in "irons" until the ship returned to this port. The police authorities here have been acquainted of the matter, but have decided, we hear, to send the Russian back to his native country.
