The Verdun Battle.

Several weeks ago keen observers across the water were predicting a heavy military offensive by the enemy in the near future. It was in their opinion necessary that Germany should gain a decision or at least obtain some advantage of a material kind to settle the disquietude at home and to re-establish their credit abroad. Speculation ranged over the whole field of operations. After examining the positions on the Russian front, around Salonika, along the Suez Canal and on the Tigris, these observers came to the conclusion that none of these theatres of war would answer the German purpose, and that the big German offensive would take place on the Western front. Hillaire Belloc, in "Land and Water" and the writers in the London Times did not attempt to locate the attack with any greater exactness. But Hillaire Belloc said that the German aims could not be possibly attained without concentrating a force of less than 300,000 first class effective. The great offensive did take place. It began early last week and is still on. It has been carried on with unprecedented vigor, so far as can be gathered, the Germans in spite of an utter disregard of the lives of their men have so far not only failed to gain what in military phrasing is called a decision and which in common parlance would be called a decisive victory, but they seemed to have failed so far to have gained any material advantage. A decisive victory would be compassed if they could destroy any considerable portion of the effective fighting forces of the French nation. A distinct material advantage would be gained, if they could straighten out the bulge in their lines formed of the region of Verdun between the point where the French lines cross the Forest of Argonne and the point in the German salient which jutts out to St. Mihiel. This bulge forms a wide mouth, bay and in it is the town of Verdun with

many forts surrounding it at various distances from Verdun as their centres. On Saturday morning the Germans claimed to have stormed one of these forts to the northeast. Later, however, the French not only drove them out, but re-captured ground beyond it. Whatever the ultimate result may be, the news to hand does not show that the Germans are making material progress in flattening out the bulge and taking the Verdun forts. If the German efforts should fall after losses on an unprecedented scale, this offensive of the Crown Prince, carried out under the stimulating presence of the Kaiser himself, the adverse effect of the battle will be far-reaching not only on Germany and Austria Bulgaria and Turkey, but among such neutrals as Roumania and Greece. The quiet confidence of the French and the way the French are standing up to what is perhaps one of the greatest offensives of the war, offer ground for the hope that the great German offensive will result in failure.
