

On that day the wind blew with hurricane force from the northwest and, said Capt. After drifting about in a helpless and unmanageable state for several hours, buffeted badly by the relentless billows, it was discovered that the leak had extended and the Edith Marguerite was making water fast. The crew then had to man the pumps and succeeded in keeping her free. Owing to the heavy head seas and strong wind the vessel was driven back about 100 miles. The next day, Sunday, January 1st, the weather moderated and an attempt was made to unhang the rudder so as to permit a "jury" being rigged, but this was found unworkable, because the braces had become water-logged. This idea had to be abandoned and the rudder was wedged
