In Towns in England, Ireland and Scotland, where the population is from 10,000 to about 15 or 20,000, you find a weekly market, and in larger ones a daily one. It would encourage the producer to increased production, lower the cost of living to the consumer. The money that would change hands would go into the shops and stores. Market Day would be our Red Letter Day.

The development of Agriculture would be encouraged. Tens of thousands of acres of valuable land now lying waste would be filled. Idle lands like idle hands are a curse to any country. In 1898 the late Hon. E. M. Jackman got a Government grant of Ten thousand dollars for the above purpose. With accrued interest there is available about \$20,000 (now in Bank).

Arboriculture Advocated.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—It is not generally known that we have two varieties of pine in Newfoundland, viz. the soft or commercial pine, and the hard pine which in Newfoundland is only ornamental. But it is ornamental and very sturdy, and I write in the hope that some attention may be given to its culture by those who love trees.

Through the kindness of Mr. Geo. Chant, of Middle Brook, Gambo, I have received three nail bags full of cones of both varieties. The soft pine cones are nearly all fertile. By placing them before the fire, the buds soon open and the seeds are easily detected and broken out. They ought then to be dried thoroughly and left in dry earth, until next April. In dry earth, until next April.

We have had a very wet autumn and most of the seed will rot on the ground unless the cones are gathered. An arbour day in the autumn might add considerably to the wealth of our country in trees to come.

Germans Capturing China's Trade.

GOING INTO PARTNERSHIP WITH CHINESE.

London.—The Germans are gradually returning to China and picking up the threads of their former business; not trading for the present under their own names but in partnership with Chinese, says a report on the commercial situation of China, by H. H. Fox, Commercial Counselor of the British Legation in Peking. German dyes and paints, needles, metals, drugs and sundries are beginning to appear on the Shanghai market, the report goes on, and it is stated that several important orders for machinery and electric plant have recently been booked by German firms. There is no doubt, the report says, that the Germans, assisted by the comparative cheapness of their products, will gradually recover the share they held in China's foreign trade before the war, but the process will be slow, as they have lost valuable connections; the business organizations they had so laboriously built up have been shattered, and they have suffered a serious loss of prestige in the eyes of the Chinese.
