Skinner Lord Curzon was fined £20 and his driving license was suspended for six nonths. The defendant's counsel did ot dispute the facts. The magistrate, after hearing a list of the convictions gainst Lord Curzon for breaches of the law by the speed of his care, said that small fines appeared to be useess to stop him.
