Dear Sir—I am a student of education and in my reading I am always on the look out for any items of interest in relation to the subject. During the past few months I have come across notes of generous gifts to education, notably in England and in the United States. Some of these notes I have cut out and put aside, and I now present them to you in the hope that you may be able to find room for them in your widely read paper.

From time to time our people respond generously to appeals for service and funds for educational work, but so far as I know we have never had in our history an instance of any man of wealth coming out "big" by making a gift of a sum of money sufficient to erect an institution or to endow one. Possibly the publication of these notes may stir some heart to do something really handsome for the good of education in the land to which he owes his wealth.

I may say that the gifts noted in the extracts appended are only a few of many such gifts. It is noteworthy that they go for the most part to the advancement of higher learning, so that the elementary education may be made better.

One Hundred Thousand Pounds—
Nearly Five Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Sir Alfred Yarrow gives £100,000 for scientific investigation and its application to practical affairs.
£250,000—Nearly a Million and a Quarter of Dollars.

The magnificent gift of £250,000 to the City of Hull for the purpose of founding a University College is one of many benefactions for educational objects which have come from Mr. T. R. Fens, who is well known as the managing director of Messrs. Rockitts and as a former member for East Hull. The City has been singularly fortunate in recent years in its educational endowments, for it is little more than thirty years ago that the Rev. John Hymers, D.D., Rector of Bramhampton, left £180,000 to found a school for the town, and though, through a defect in the will, the full amount of the bequest was not realized, still the foundation of Hymers College was ultimately accomplished and the intentions of its founder carried out. Hull may not have the immense population surrounding it, as have the two Yorkshire university cities of Leeds and Sheffield, but it is rapidly growing counts already 200,000 inhabitants, and, as the chief seaport for the vast industrial district of South Yorkshire, has undoubtedly great opportunities and a great future before it. Mr. Fens, by his splendid generosity, has shown his confidence and faith in that future, but his gift has an even wider significance. It is of national importance that a leader of industry like Mr. Fens should so definitely and practically affirm his belief in the value to the State of higher education, and it is of almost equal importance that his action may be regarded as a sign of hope and encouragement at a time marked rather by depression and reaction.

The immediate effect in Hull itself of Mr. Fens's gift should be twofold. It should not only stimulate and focus the educational work now being done in the excellent secondary and higher schools which the city possesses, but it should also give fresh activity and life to all the social and intellectual movements in the locality. Time is required for all this; but no doubt, as the College grows and develops, it will more and more attract the interest and generosity of other Hull citizens, until in the end a great university for East Yorkshire and Lincolnshire may be a possibility. Hull is not only remarkable for its rapid growth commercially during recent years, but it also possesses a history of more than ordinary interest, dating back to the granting of its charter by Edward I. It is the city of Andrew Marvell and Wilberforce. Its future history will, without question, add the name of Fens to its roll of patriotic citizens.

£50,000—Nearly a Quarter of a Million Dollars.

Recently the Prince of Wales was the principal guest at the annual banquet of the Honourable Society of Cymmrodorion at the Hotel Cecil, London.

The Prince, who is Chancellor of the University of Wales, and Colonel of the Welsh Guards, received the society's medal as a recognition of "distinguished service rendered to Wales."

During the evening the honorary secretary, Sir Vincent Evans, announced that in honor of the Prince and Wales one of their guests was prepared to give £50,000 for the benefit of the University of Wales.

The message, added Sir Vincent, was signed by a man who could back up his promise without the slightest difficulty—Mr. Dan Radcliffe.

The Prince thanked Mr. Radcliffe for his generous gift and proposed his health.

Mr. Radcliffe, who is a well-known Cardiff shipowner, was cordially received on risks to respond. He said

that on the day when the Prince was made head of the university he made up his mind to do something for the university, first of all as a tribute to the Prince, and secondly, as a tribute to his own native land.

Giving Away the Kodak Millions.

We are all indebted to George Eastman for the kodaks which, his factory has turned out in Rochester for many years. His services to us has brought him wealth in millions. The earlier part of this month he gave away his last great block of stock in his company. Gave away, we say, but really he made provision for its sale at a figure considerably less than its market value, in order to give Massachusetts Institute of Technology four and a half million dollars, the University of Rochester eight and a half million, and Hampton and Tuskegee one million each.

Three million dollars of the gift to the University of Rochester goes to the Eastman School of Music, two and a half million to the School of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and one and a half each to the Medical School and the College for Women. Altogether Mr. Eastman has given away nearly

fifty-nine million dollars in publicly known gifts.

He is making the University of Rochester a great school. Into it he has poured more than twenty-three and a half million dollars. He has done an especially remarkable piece of work in stimulating musical education in Rochester. He has made it possible for practically every Rochester child who wants to learn to play a musical instrument to do so.

Another product of his interest in music is the Rochester Symphony Orchestra, to be compared to any in the country. Mr. Eastman's vision and gifts may make Rochester one of these days as much of a musical centre as Munich or Milan. Last July he allowed his employees to buy stock in the Kodak Company in much the same way as he is giving it to the colleges. His gift to the workers came to nine million dollars.

Of his latest gift, Mr. Eastman said: "For some time past the accumulation of money personally has lost its importance for me. Therefore my interest in the company has not been affected by the money from its shares."—Christian Work.
