The bill now before the Ontario Legislature for the establishment of a training school for idiotic and im-becile children provides among other things for the purchase of a suit. able lot of land, on which buildings may be erected for the purposes of such a training school. No child shall be received into the institution, except under the order of the Proial Secretary, without a certificate from two legally qualified medical practitioners, setting forth that after proper examination of the child for whom application for admission is made, and after due enquiries into all the facts relating to his, or her, case, they find him or her to be an idiot and incapable of being instructed in the ordinary schools of the province. The application of and mission to the institution of any idiot shall be signed by the parents, gaucilains, relation or friend of such idiot, or by the Council of the Municipality in which he or-she residers.
