TWO-BODIED, TWO-HEADED SIAMESE SALMON

Could They Be Successfully Produced on Commercial Basis, Industry Would Be Revolutionized

(Vancouver Province).

There is a wonderful sockeye salmon in Vancouver and if its like, could be produced in millions in the hatcheries on the Fraser River there would be solved the problem of the people of this food-fish—a problem which has been bothering scientists and fishermen ever since the first salmon cannery was built in British Columbia.

This salmon would not appear in the slightest degree remarkable if you saw only its head, but aft of the gills this fish drops all resemblance to others of its species. It branched out at that point for itself and did so well that it developed two bodies. Therein

lies the great value of this fish from a food standpoint. Having but one head it would have but one mouth to feed, thus making for economy, because it is declared by scientists that the cost of living is rapidly advancing at sea as well as on land.

Having two well-developed bodies this fish would be invaluable to canners, though it is possible that when first introduced it might cause trouble between the fishermen and canners over the question of price, as the former would doubtless claim pay for two fish, while the latter might be depended on to argue that it was but one fish.

It is agreed by the man in whose possession this particular and most remarkable fish is that it should take a most important place in the economies of fish culture. He contends that there is only so much food in the sea for sockeye salmon and the more salmon that can be strung one one head with one mouth the easier will it be to populate the waters with salmon bellies such as the canner delights to

see lying in the big bins on the floor of the packing plant.

Would be Sea Searcher

Some people who have seen the salmon incline to the opinion that only with difficulty could it steer a course through the water; they declare that the propelling force of one body would be working against that of the other to the great bewilderment of the sense of direction located in the head. On the other hand, some who have become interested in the phenomenon insist that the salmon would have no difficulty in getting through the water and that its speed would be greatly increased because it really it would have the motive power of two bodies. Those taking this view point out that as a twin screw steamer is faster than one possessing but a single screw so would the twin-bodied fish be able to search the water where its old-fashioned brother could but make the liquid a little warm.

Sad Jolts for Nature
This controversy as to the speed

possibilities of the new fish is, however, of no interest to the canners and as practical men they point out that no matter if the salmon has a few shortcomings it still possesses a great advantage in having a head of no larger than will conveniently fit into the mesh of the gill net allowed by law. All the packers are in favor of the phenomenon.

Practical hatchery men are, however, not very enthusiastic concerning the possibilities of introducing the new model in quantities which would make it commercially profitable. They have seen the two-bodied single header and know the conditions under which it is produced, but they declare that it is not always possible to turn out this style because frequently something goes wrong in the miter and the result is often two heads on a single body. They also say that sometimes the product is too perfectly formed fish hitched together with a Siamese joint, or again the head is where the tail should be, or the fish is twisted till it looks like an animated inter-

action mark going through the water.

Fry Live Long Time

Examples of these freak fish are in the possession of a well known cannery man in Vancouver. He is not very sanguine that the desirable two-bodied single-header could be successfully propagated because of the uncertainty that the efforts in that direction would not result in the production of the undesirable and useless freaks before mentioned, some examples of which both about in alcohol beside the specimen which would revolutionize the canning industry if it could be hatched in millions.

The secret of the freaks is deduced to lie in the failure of the hatchery men to thoroughly separate the salmon eggs when they are brought into contact with the milt of the male salmon. When eggs are not separated they continue joined throughout the process of hatching; the fry from such eggs finally appearing in the most grotesque shapes. These young fish frequently live for a long time.

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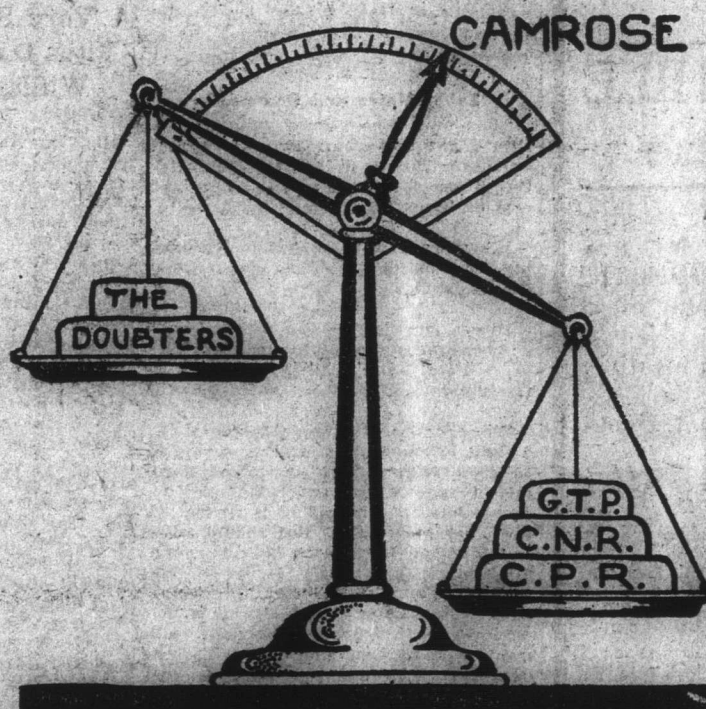
