Though presented to a good many men, the project did not meet with a favorable reception; but events entirely unrelated to the plan were working in its favor. News had gotten itself into The News had gotten itself into deep water through an expensive libel suit based on an imputation against the conduct displayed by the 65th French Canadian regiment of Montreal in the Riel rebellion of 1885. Mr. Sheppard was blamed for this article, but as a matter of fact it was written by Louis P. Kribs, and editor-in-chief never saw it until too late to undo the mischief.
