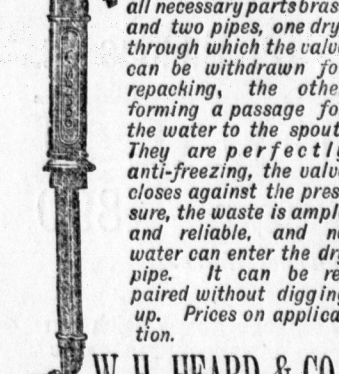

### LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—"The Sea King" to-night.

The petition asking for the commutation of Birchall's sentence has secured over 225 signatures in this city.

A couple of inches of snow fell in this locality early this morning, but the bright sunlight soon caused it to disappear.

Rev. W. J. McKay, of the South London Baptist Church, will occupy the pulpit of the Baptist Church, Sarnia, on Sunday next.

The great W. J. Gilmore Opera Company arrived in this city this morning and will appear this evening in "The Sea King," the new comic opera which caused such favorable comment in New York and Philadelphia.

The new Church of England in London West, which will be formally opened on Nov. 23, will be lighted by electricity. The suburban will be to the front in this respect, as no church in the city has yet adopted that method.

The merry jingle of sleigh-bells enlivened the city this morning soon after 6 o'clock, when a small cutter drawn by four horses with three passengers dashed through the streets taking advantage of the first fall of "the beautiful snow."

At the Y. M. C. A. anniversary sermons, which will be preached by most of the city ministers on Sunday next, statements will be read in the different churches during the service by members of the association dealing with its growth and work in the city.

The Salvation Army will this evening hold services for the first time in their new barracks in the north end, the old Meth-

dist Church on Pall Mall street having been rented in a suitable manner. The army will still hold their city meetings in Mechanics' Hall.

Mr. Lyman Oscar Odell died at his family residence, 311 Dundas street, yesterday, aged 56. He was well known and extensively related in Westminster, where he previously lived. Deceased had been living in London for some time past, and leaves a widow and grown-up family.

—Arthur Jolly, a 9-year-old boy brought out from England and placed on a farm, gave himself up to the police here a while ago, the former being sent him away. Some citizens interested themselves in his behalf and have provided a place for him to live. He was accordingly allowed to go by the Police Magistrate this morning.

—McCarthy & Reynolds' "Dear Irish Boy" Company will be at the Grand Opera House on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings next, and that large audiences will attend is a foregone conclusion. The San Francisco Call says: "Harvey Daff requires after Boucicault, the best acting in the Shaugbraun. Mr. Reynolds is intrusted with the important part, and meets its requirements. His make-up is exceptionally good, and his manner is full of the devilish turpitude of his nature. The part could not have been better played."

A very pleasant event occurred yesterday at the residence of Mr. Nixon, St. Johns, it being the occasion of the marriage of his eldest daughter Alma to William C. Sutherland, of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. M. Johnston, of Alvinston, in the presence of about 60 invited guests, quite a number of whom were from a distance. The presentation to the bride was both numerous and costly. In the evening the St. Johns brass band serenaded the Doctor's house and played several fine selections, after which they were invited in and partook of a hearty supper. The young couple left the city on a trip through the Western States, and purpose settling in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

**Strathroy Items.**

At a annual meeting of the Strathroy Branch Bible Society was held in the Presbyterian Church on the evening of Oct. 23. The president, Mr. Thos. Gordon, occupied the chair. Music was furnished by the choir of the church under the direction of Mr. H. E. Maitland. Excellent addresses were given by President W. G. Jordan and Dr. Aylesworth. The report was read and adopted. It showed that the sum of \$165 had been given as free donations, and the balance now in hand was \$1270. Owing to the weather, and another service the same evening, the meeting was not very largely attended, but was otherwise quite successful and interesting.

John W. Buttery, son of Mr. George Buttery, of Adelaide, aged 17 years, died on Sunday morning after a long illness. He had been in Pennsylvania for many years, returning to Canada last spring on account of declining health. The funeral on Tuesday afternoon was a very large one, Rev. P. K. Dayfoot conducting the service.

**Ald. James Lunney Sustained.**

Could the readers have peeped into the parlors of Mr. Henry Widdow, of South London, last evening, they would have been convinced that it was not ill-health or despondency that caused Ald. James Lunney to absent himself from the Council meeting. In fact, it was the evening set for the nuptials of the genial alderman and Miss Bessie Winnett, and about 50 intimate friends of the contracting parties from Toronto and other places were present to witness the ceremony. The knot was tied by Rev. George Henderson, the bride being given away by her father, the host. She wore a rich cream satin, trimmed with hanged lace, and looked charming. The bridesmaids were Misses Jackson (Toronto), Lunney and Moran, and they wore mauve, pink and blue cashmere, respectively, trimmed with swan's down. Dr. Winnett, of Toronto, and Messrs. Scott and Winnett, of this city, supported the groom. After partaking of a wedding breakfast, the couple left on the Erie express for a two weeks' tour.

**Commissioner Esary on Temperance.**

The Royal Templars of Temperance, Council 271, held a very successful open house at their hall the other evening. Mr. E. T. Esary, of this city, gave a pointed address, telling of the possibilities for local prohibition under existing laws if the temperance workers of Ontario and Nisour township acted up to their privilege. Every bar for the sale of intoxicating liquors could, he said, be permanently wiped out, and what was true for Nisour township was true of every other township in the land—a consummation to be earnestly hoped for. Rev. Mr. Seburn, of Thorndale, gave a good speech, showing that the higher law enforces total prohibition. Besides these telling speeches there were excellent temperance readings and recitations given by members of the council. Miss Langford recited the poem, "Look Alcott, in a style that won the admiration of the audience. The most excellent of the evening was given by the choir of the Methodist and Episcopalian churches, assisted by members of the council. A grand song by Mr. French was quite a novelty. The meeting throughout was a success, and augurs well for the future of the temperance interests of Thorndale and its vicinity.
