This, therefore, extends from the bar-rel to such a distance as to permit of the barrel being rapidly swung about on its center. Pressed over the ends of the wails of the barrel are rims of pressed steel three-fourths of an inch thick and extending downward three inches. It is on an indented surface, in the inner portion of this had no trouble from the disease since rim that the head of the barrel rests. end hold them in place and permit of the heads being easily removed or placed in short order.
