be taken to Dresden for burial. VLADIVOSTOCK TO BE IMPROVED London, Aug. 20.-The Russian Government has dispatched engineers to carry out the works necessary to make Vladivostock a commercial port. It is hoped they will be completed during 1897. Prince Khilkoff, the Minister of Communications, who has gained considerable experience in railroad matters through visiting the United States and serving on railroads there, beginning as an assistant stoker, is now inspecting the Trans-Siberian Railway, and will proceed to Vladivostock. From there the Prince will go to Japan, and thence to San Francisco, New York, London and Paris.

Sir Charles Tupper Makes a Peculia?

Objection. Royal Commission to, Inquire Into the State of the Militia.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.-As telegraphed yesterday afternoon, the election of a Speaker was the only business transacted by the House of Commons at its first session. The name of Hon. James D. Edgar, member for West Ontario, was moved by Mr. Laurier, seconded by Sir Richard Cartwright. There was no objection to him on the part of the Opposition. Sir Charles Tupper, who spoke for them, contented himself with expressing regret that the Government should have departed from the custom which would have given the Speakership of this Parliament to a French member. The remark was received by the French Liberals with laughter, which did not encourage the baronet's complaint. After brief speeches by Hon. Mr. Laurier, and Sir Charles Tupper, Dr. Bourinot, as clerk of the House, put the motion, and, in accordance with the response, declared Mr. Edgar elected Speaker. Mr. Edgar acknowledged his election in an appropriate speech. He made a hit by repeating it in French after having spoken it in English. The Conservative Frenchmen joined laughing applause which rewarded the Speaker's graceful compliment to the French-Canadian section of the House. This concluded the formalities of the day, and the House adjourned un-

til todav at 3 p.m. Premier Laurier looked spick and span. He wore a black morning coat and vest and gray trousers, and carried a new silk hat, cane and tan gloves in his hand. His followers cheered him enthusiastically.
