Fighting at Candia

Between British Troops and Bashi-Bazouks.

Sixteen of the British and a Number of the Moslems Killed.

Three Hundred Blue Jackets Replace the Italian Garrison.

Turkey Getting Ready to Resume Hostilities.

Furloughs of Her Army Officers Cancelled—Rumors of a Treaty Between Roumania and Turkey.

London, July 14.—The Times' Athens correspondent says official dispatches have been received announcing that a serious conflict has taken place at Candia between a force of British troops and a party of Bashi-Bazouks, arising from the British intervening in a skirmish between the Bashi-Bazouks and Christians.

Sixteen of the British force and a number of the Bashi-Bazouks were killed.

The admiral of the foreign fleets have sent five warships to Candia to suppress any further Mohammedan movement.

No further details of the conflict have been received, but passengers who have just arrived from Candia state that on account of excesses by Bashi-Bazouks, 300 British marines have been landed at Candia to replace the Italian garrison there. The Bashi-Bazouks have been summoned by proclamation to surrender their arms within four days. They have held a meeting and addressed a petition to the sultan.

TURKEY PREPARING TO RESUME HOSTILITIES.

London, July 14.—Advices from Constantinople indicate that the sultan is obdurate regarding the Greek ultimatum of the peace proposals. Edhem Pasha is hastening back to Domokos, and the furloughs of all Turkish officers have been recalled in readiness for a renewal of hostilities. The foreign ambassadors to Turkey, recognizing that a treaty was impossible, are not inclined to continue diplomatic proceedings until they know in what way coercion is to be applied.

The Frankfort Zeitung's Constantinople correspondent says it is reported that a treaty was concluded at the Yildiz Kiosk yesterday between the Roumanian and Turkish governments, by the terms of which Roumania is to furnish military assistance to Turkey in the event of Bulgaria developing warlike designs. It is understood that one of the great powers helped to arrange the treaty.

If the news contained in the Zeitung's dispatch is true, it may be regarded as an important move on the part of Turkey, as it was believed in some quarters that the powers were taking the Bulgarians into account as a means of coercing the sultan into acceptance of the terms of peace offered.

The Tagblatt's Constantinople correspondent says that the British and French ambassadors to Turkey are about to be recalled, owing to their governments being dissatisfied with their conduct in connection with the peace negotiations.

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New Sayings of Christ

Translation of the Logia Just Found in Egypt.

The Date of the Document is Believed to Be Not Later Than 200 A. D.—Some Sayings That Are Not Found in Any of the Gospels, and May Give Rise to Controversies.

London, July 14.—Among the discoveries made at Behneseh by Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt, of the Egyptian exploration fund, is a small page, 5 1/2 inches by 3 1/2 inches, containing eight sayings of Christ. The logia consist of detached quotations, each beginning "Jesus saith."

The first saying is: "And thou shalt see clearly to cast out the devil, that is in thy brother's eye."

The second is startling and entirely new. It reads: "Jesus saith: except ye fast to the world ye shall not find the kingdom of God; and except ye keep the Sabbath ye shall not see the Father."

This being at variance with the accepted teachings of Christ, it is suggested that it is perhaps a Jewish forgery committed with a view to supporting the Jewish Sabbath. Perhaps it is an erroneous report.

The third saying is similar to that found in the Gospels, but is different. Christ describes himself as standing in the midst of the world, finding all men drunken and none an atheist. "And my soul grieved over the sons of men because they are blind in their hearts."

The fourth saying has perished, only one word remaining. This is the Greek word for beggary. And this was not used by Christ in any gospel, the logia is considered to have been new.

The fifth saying, which contains certain gaps, is of extraordinary interest. It reads: "Jesus saith, wherever there are (there occurs a gap) and there is one (gap) alone am I with him. Raise the stone and there thou shalt find me; cleave the wood and there I am."

The latter part is entirely new, and it is expected that it will arouse controversy. It seems to indicate a pantheistic philosophy, and, perhaps, a revelation of the mystic character of the gnostics in the early Christian centuries.

The sixth saying coincides in part with Luke, vi., 24—"No prophet is accepted in his own country; neither do men obey him who cures upon them that know him."

This is considered to prove that Luke had the same original records as the logia, because the Greek word accepted, here dekotos, was used by a scribe only, and was hitherto supposed to be a scribe's error. It is changed on Matthew's collection.

TWO FLOODS.

Newburgh, N. None of the Murphys were lost. The wife and two children of John Conroy were killed. An Italian child, named Lourey, died, and Mrs. Ann Ferry and her child Willie were also lost. A short distance from the Murphy house was a building occupied by 25 laborers, mostly Slavs, with a few Italian. One of the laborers, named John Zulca, was killed. A Hung- kow, whose name and number is unknown, is missing. His remains are probably in the ruins.

Of those who perished these have been identified: Mrs. Mary Conroy, wife of the engineer of the Beacon Mountain; John Zulca, Willie Ferry and the Italian child, Slena Lourey. The remaining bodies have not been found.
