PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 27.—Directum, the champion trotter (record 2:05), defeated Saladin, the pacer (record 2:05), this afternoon in a match on the Point Breest track of the Philadelphia Driving Park Association.

Saladin in a five burst of speed won the first heat in 2:10. Directum took the next three and the race in 2:10, 2:11 and 2:12.

The track was somewhat soft and therefore he was two and three seconds slow.

In view of this circumstance the performance of the two great stallions at a season of the year when the thoroughbreds are usually in winter quarters may justly be regarded as remarkable. Throughout the four heats Directum trotted perfectly, not breaking once, whereas Saladin went into the air at least once in each heat.
