Himself Again.

Sir Richard Will Once More Sit

Mr. S. Shell, the Patron Can-

And Styles Sir Richard the Champion of the Farmers' Interests.

The Sitting Member's Nomination Made Unanimous-Spirited Speeches by the Candidates Misrepresen-

tation Refuted.

The grand old Liberal riding of South Oxford will again be represented on the floor of Parliament by the valiant Sir Richard Cartwright. At the finest political convention in its history Tuesday the Liberals, for the third time, honored the man who has been such an honor to them. Nomination by the South Oxford Liberals means election, whoever the nominee may be, and with Sir Richard Cartwright as the standard-bearer, it is doubtful if the hosts of Reform there will find an enemy arrayed against them. A striking evidence of Sir Richard's strength was the announcement made from the platform of the convention by Mr. M. S. Shell, the candidate of the Patrons of Industry nominated in March last to contest the riding. "I want you to distinctly understand." he declared amid cheers, "that it was never my intention to op-pose Sir Richard Cartwright if he ran. Sir Richard has been the champion of the interests of the farmers of this country. (Cheers.) There is no man who has been more fearless in his denunciation of what he believed to be wrong in the halls of Parliament. He stands today without a single charge of corruption on his conduct. As a Patron, I think I am fully consistent in taking this course. The Patron and Liberal platforms are identical. (Hear, hear.) We should unite to wipe out the

iniquities of the protective tariff." (Cheers.) The convention was magnificent in numbers and enthusiasm. The com-modious town hall at Norwich was too small to hold it. Not only the official delegates, but Liberals from every cor-ner of South Oxford came by rail or road. The morning train from Woodstock was packed, and the passengers on arrival at Norwich found the hotels overflowing with members of the same political faith from far and near, making the town decidely Grit for the day at

least. THE CONVENTION OPENED. It was 1 p.m. when Mr. Alex. McFarlane, of Otterville, president of the Liberal Association of South Oxford, took the chair and called the convention to order. Every seat was taken and the aisles and doors choked by the crowd. Unusual interest attached to the meeting, in view of the fact that Mr. S. H. Janes, of Toronto, a native of the county, was definitely in the field, but the excitement was tempered by the utmost good nature on both sides, and by a determination to abide by the choice of the majority and to sacrifice personal pre-

ferences to the party's welfare.

others five minutes. Sir Richard Speaks. The present member, Sir Richard Cartwright, was received with such enthusiastic applause that it plainly indicated he had a majority in the convention. Sir Richard, after a few grateful words, said he regretted that he had not been able to spend as much time in South Oxford as he would have liked to, and he had heard that his non-residence was a ground of objection to his candidature. Living 300 miles away, it was hardly possible for him at a few hours' notice to make an appearance in his constituency for a day, and to go there and back meant three or four days. A man of many political engage-ments might spare a day often, but it was almost impossible for him to be absent from his engagements three or four days consecutively. Another rea-son was the great amount of toil and responsibility thrust upon the Liberal

leaders owing to the extraordinary odds they had to fight, because the Province had been SO VILELY GERRYMANDERED. "You don't perhaps understand the toil the gerrymander has added to the leaders in Ontario," he added. "Perhaps you will when I tell you, to the scandal of Canada, that today two Reform votes only count on the floor of Parliament for as much as one Conservative vote. At the last election we put 180,000 voters in battle array. Our opponents scarcely put a few hundred more. We divided forces at the polls, but when we counted noses on the floor of Parliament we found 60 Conservative members representing 180,000 Conservative votes and 32 Reform members representing 180,000 Liberal votes.

(Cries of "Shame!")
Sir Richard showed how this had Sir Richard snowed now this had added enormously to the work of the Ontario leaders. They had not a decent headquarters staff of secretaries and agents like their openents. They had to do their own work at their own expense. "In the eight years that I have pense. "In the eight years that had the honor of being your representative three-fourths of my time has been ative three-fourths myself rich, not devoted, not to making myself rich, not to my private advantage, but to the WORK OF THE REFORM PARTY. (Cheers.) From the 1st of October, 1890, to the 1st of August, 1892, what between the general election, the long session of Parliament that followed, and the task

of fighting the bye-elections, I do not

believe I spent three consecutive days in my own house or attending to my own business." (Applause.)
He appreciated the sacrifices South Oxford had made for the Liberal party since the days of George Brown, and he had always been ready to step down and out for any resident Reformer tried and true, or any Reformer with a pure, clean record of work done and sacrifices performed for the cause. (Cheers.) Of 300 gentlemen whom he had interviewed concerning his candidature he found only half a dozen, mostly of the Patron persuasion, who told him that they were pledged to stand by the Patron candidate if he came out, but if he did not, they had no fault to find with the speaker on the score of non-residence. Sir Richard said there had been a conspiracy set on foot in North Oxford which was insulting to the Liberal leaders, who had been accused of being afraid to speak out, and of sending men to the riding privately to stab him (Sir Richard) behind his back. At Mount Elgin he had asked anyone to tell him who were the asked anyone to tell him who were the Reform leaders who had sent such a message, but had received no reply.

"If there be any man here today who will dare to rise and tell this audience that he has the authority of any man who calls himself a Reform leader to say that there is discord in our camp, to say that my good friends in Ottawa

desire to see me out, let him stand forth and do it now and here, and I promise

with the names of those who, while pro-fessing friendship to my face, would try to stab me behind my back." (Cheers.) Sir Richard did not think there was a friend or foe of that most honorable gentleman, Mr. Laurier, who would believe that he would lend himself in the slightest degree to any such base pro-position. (Applause.) The speaker was not afraid of the Government, but he had some fear of the forces behind it. Now, if ever, the Reform party should SHOW THEMSELVES UNITED, if they hoped to win. He had had 32 years of Parliamentary experience, and he knew the craft, the arts, the tricks and devices by which the Reform party was wrecked many years ago—was wrecked again at the time of Confederation, and again in the administration of Hon. Alexander Mackenzie. He had proofs from every quarter of the Do-minion to show how the Reform party was basely slandered when it was asserted that the only way to get rid of an obnoxious colleague was to assas-

Liberals. The convention had it in its power to render a service to the Reform party by stamping out the slan-(Cheers.) Sir Richard explained that he came to South Oxford owing to the gerry-mander of 1882 contrived by the late Sir John A. Macdonald, of lamented memory, by which the boundaries of 54 constituencies were altered at one fell swoop, under the pretense that it was necessary to add four to the numerical

representation. He (Sir Richard) was the only man of the whole 54 whose constituency was singled out FOR ABSOLUTE DESTRUCTION. Many of his colleagues were hurt, but Center Huron, the speaker's riding, was wiped out of existence. Where could they find a parallel for its meanness? "I was deprived of the seat I formerly held," said Sir Richard, "and then you, without solicitation on my part, came forward and put me in. I hope you have not repented it. (Cries of 'No.') I have not. Now, I say to you, do as you please. I do not forget the fashion in which you came to my rescue in the past, and I have faith in the honor, the judgment, the spirit and pat-

riotism which has always pervaded electors of South Oxford." (Cheers.) Mr. Janes.

Mr. Janes was received by his friend with applause, and announced himsel a candidate. He trusted the utmos good feeling would prevail. We should remember they were all Liberals. (Applause). He would heartily support the free-will choice of the majority of the duly elected delegates. It was a credit for any man to aspire to a Parliamentary position, and wrong for any man to se another for entertaining such a laudable ambition. He had frequently declined to stand for municipal and Parliamentary office; because a man's first duty was to his family, and going osed being to Ottawa meant the abandonment of his business. He was no ness, and was in a position to devote his time to the office. He was raised in West Oxford on the farm where he lived for the first 22 years of his life, and where his father settled in 1802. He would be very stupid indeed if he had not improved by his Toronto experiences. A Parliamentary representative, he im-

agined, should own property in his riding and be in touch with the people. "I am loyal Grit from cellar to garrett, as my father was before me. (Applause.) I am a loyal follower of our honored Mr. Laurier, who stands with-out a peer today as a leader. (Ap-mends itself to any man who wishes well of his country. We want the greatest possible measure of free trade that is consistent with our revenue requirements. I have and always will vote for any measure for the promotion of tem-perance. The Liberal party is the only one which has given the temperance people satisfactory legislation. (Applause.) Let us not be divided but stand together and support the candidate who is the free choice of the con-

vention." (Cheers.) OTHER NOMINEES. Mr. Henry Cox pleaded for unity in the riding. Were they going to throw over Sir Richard from Kingston for a gentleman from Toronto? They should consider the whole Dominion and not South Oxford alone. (Cheers.) He retired on behalf of Sir Richard Cart-

wright.

Mr. Andrew Pattullo, proprietor of the Woodstock Sentinel-Review, made a rattling speech and stirred up considerable enthusiasm. He said he had no ambition at present to go to Parliament. He saw no local candidate who had greater claims to the representation than Sir Richard Cartwright. Qualifications being equal, he would favor a local man. "It would make little dif-ference to the riding whether a local or outside man is chosen, but it might make a great difference to the party and the country. (Cheers.) He asked them to consider the question above petty local influences and from the higher standpoint of the interests of the party and of Canada. Mr. M. S. Shell, the Patron nominee,

whose speech has already been alluded to, followed. He is a fluent speaker. Mr. Philip Kelly retired in favor of Mr. Janes, who, he said, had made a success of life, having gone to Toronto a poor boy and worked himself up in the midst of the greatest competition. Mr. J. B. Jackson, of Ingersoll, announced himself a supporter of Sir Richard Cartwright. He read letters from Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and other

Liberal leaders highly eulogizing Sir Richard and refuting the statements that he was at variance with them. Mr. T. Buchanan, of Ingersoll, spoke in Mr. Janes' favor.
Dr. McKay, M.P.P., of Ingersoll, was glad to see Mr. Shell come back into the fold. He hoped Liberals would stick loyally to the nominee of the convention, and predicted a rousing vic-

tory for the party.

Speech-making was then cut short in order to allow the northern delegates to catch the train. All nominees retired except Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. SIR RICHARD CHOSEN.

The polling commenced about 4:34 p.m. and the result was awaited with intense interest. Cheer after cheer rent the air when Sir Richard Cartwright was declared the nominee by a vote of On motion of Mr. A. Pattullo, seconded by Warden Watterworth, the nom-

ination was made unanimous. Sir Richard was given an ovation, and said they had rendered a service, not so much to him as to the Liberal
