THE SEASON FOR DROWNINGS

Ten Cases, Mostly Those of Bathers.

Man Gored to Death by a Bull—Fatal Explosion—Suicide of a Lady.

Ottawa, July 24.—A lad named Guay, 8 years old, was drowned at Brewery Creek, Hull, Sunday night. He was crossing the creek with his mother and fell in, and before the mother got assistance he was drowned.

Winnipeg, July 24.—Frank Burns, a Portage la Prairie boy, was drowned while bathing at Eagle Creek, Lake Manitoba, Sunday, through taking cramps. He was 17 years of age.

Kingston, Ont., July 24.—Barney Lomas, an employee at Macleod's tannery, was drowned on Sunday near Cataract bridge.

Monroe, Mich., July 24.—Jay Underhill, a prosperous farmer of La Salle township, was drowned near the mouth of Otter Creek while bathing. He was 50 years old.

Thirteen-year-old Otto Kolb was drowned at the Waterloo dam while bathing.

Jonesville, Mich., July 24.—Willie Abbott, aged 14, dived into the mill race and failed to come to the surface.

Blackinaw City, Mich., July 24.—E. A. Tanner, while fishing from a dock at Cecil Bay, seven miles west of Macleod, fell into the water and was drowned.

Big Rapids, Mich., July 24.—W. Francis Thompson, a school teacher from Sandiacre county, 26 years old, was drowned in sight of three of his pupils, who tried in vain to aid him. His parents live near Deckerville.

Madeline Island, Mich., July 24.—Richard Dupont, aged 16, who was thrown into the water by the capsizing of a sailboat while out sailing Saturday afternoon.

North Bay, Ont., July 24.—The body of Parvis, aged 18, who disappeared on Thursday, was recovered Sunday afternoon near the new government wharf, where he was riding his bicycle when last seen alive. His wheel was recovered about ten feet away from where his body lay.

KILLED BY A BULL.

Belleville, July 24.—Edward Cartwright was gored by a bull Sunday night, and died in the hospital four hours later. Mr. Cartwright, who was employed by John S. McGurn, on the second concession of Thurlow, went with his wife to milk the cows when a Jersey bull attacked him. The woman drove the bull off, but not until after its horns had penetrated her husband's abdomen.

FATAL EXPLOSION.

Winnipeg, July 24.—E. Headland and a companion named G. Anderson were killed in an explosion resulting from nitroglycerine at the Sault Ste. Marie, when it exploded. Headland was killed, and Anderson badly injured.

SHOT HERSELF.

Havelockia, Ont., July 24.—Mrs. A. Mell, a highly-respected resident, in a fit of temporary insanity, resulted from a severe illness, committed suicide by shooting.

SUICIDE AT MONTREAL.

Montreal, July 24.—William Linton, a commercial traveler, 55 years of age, committed suicide at the St. Lawrence Hall, in this city, on Saturday night. His dead body was found in one of the baths. He had opened a vein in one of his wrists, and bled to death. The deceased was a brother of James Linton, the well-known boot and shoe manufacturer, of Montreal. It is not known what led him to commit suicide.

The Rodney Presbyterian Church is undergoing important changes.

St. Thomas Chinese laundries were attacked by mobs of boys on Saturday night. One or two Chinamen were badly used.

Jos. Gale was shot in the leg at St. Thomas by an unknown person while delivering milk Saturday night. A petition is in circulation at Windsor asking the school board to set aside St. Alphonse and St. Francis schools as separate schools.

Oscar Wing, son of Rev. M. L. Wing, of Berlin, was shot in the leg on Friday by the discharge of a gun from which he was attempting to remove a charge.

Miss Ann Mickle, a highly respected resident of Amherstburg, is dead. She was born in 1841 and lived most of her life in the township of Malden, near Amherstburg.

Thomas Thompson died at his residence on Parent avenue, Windsor, Saturday morning after an illness of two years. He was at one time baggage man at the Grand Trunk Railway depot.

The residence of Judge McHugh, on Quellerie avenue, Windsor, was broken into by burglars Sunday morning, who took the small change they found in the judge's pockets and made their escape.

The 18-months-old daughter of Mr. Thomas Summers, St. Thomas, had a narrow escape from being killed on Friday. While playing on the street she was run over by a grocer's wagon, the wheel passing over her head.

John Hodgson, who disappeared so strangely from his home near Ayr on June 21 is wandering west, apparently semi-demented. Word has been received by his father that he was at a relative's at Hanover for five days, but that the other day he left suddenly and mysteriously, and once again his whereabouts are unknown.

Sarnia Observer: A number of Alf. Macvicar's friends met at the parlors of the Belchamber last evening and presented him with a complimentary address and a handsome gold locket chain, on the occasion of his departure to Ottawa, where he has been ordered to report for duty. Alf is a general favorite, and his friends are sorry to have him leave town, but all hope that his removal will be only temporary.

While Archibald Carmichael, of West Lorne was driving cattle to Dutton on Saturday, a 2-year-old steer suddenly went mad, and rushing down the road turned into the lane of Mr. George Binks, and knocked over Ashton Binks, a boy about 11 years of age. His sister seeing the accident, and thinking her brother was killed, fainted away, and has been in a state of complete nervous prostration ever since. The boy was not hurt. The steer died ten minutes after striking the lad.

At Springbank last night the spontaneous laughter of children and the apparent, though more restrained, merriment of older folks, was the best of evidence of the efficiency of Leon and La Mart as mirth-makers of exceptional worth.
