

PETERBORO'S SENSATION

Trunk Containing a Corpse Shipped to Kingston-A Young Medical Student Arrested in Connection With the Circumstance.

Peterboro, Ont., Feb. zi.-Peterboro has a sensation in the trunk and corpse line, which may develop facts of a most thrilling nature. At an early hour this morning Alexander Reid, a local expressman, was sum-moned by Wm. Patterson, of Smith street, to do an errand which involved bringing a large empty trunk from B. Shortly's store to the house on Smith street. The trunk was taken to the yard in rear of the house by Mr. Patterson, Mr. Reid being told to remain out in front. The trunk was shortly afterwards brought out and loaded on the sleigh. Mr. Patterson

loaded on the sleigh. Mr. Patterson then got into the sleigh himself, and was driven to the Grand Trunk station, where the trunk was checked through to Kingston, Mr. Patterson presumably having a ticket for that city and leaving by the same train.

Before the train pulled out, Reid was approached by George Clark, G. T. R. cection man and one of his men who section man, and one of his men who made the astonishing statement that they had seen Patterson unwrapping some coverings from a corpse in the rear of his residence, and afterwards bundling the body into a trunk, which was then placed in Reid's sleigh. TRUNK. Clark and his man both live north of Smith street, and come to their work by way of the G. T. R. track, from which a clear view of Patterson's back yard can be obtained. They stated positively that they saw Patterson discard the tray of the trunk, and after removing two coats from a body, placed an unwieldy body, which they are convinced was a corpse, into

Patterson was made acquainted with

the facts, and after ejaculating an oath, he jumped on the train, giving his interrogaters no further satisfac-tion. Clark at once told Policeman Adams what had transpired. Adams laid the matter before the chief, and Belleville was communicated with, resulting in a message being received that Patterson had been taken from

the train and placed under arrest.

Chief Russell left at noon for his prisoner, and notified Reid to meet the Belleville train and take the trunk to the police station. The trunk was not opened in that city, but was taken to the afternoon train and shipped to Peterboro. Patterson is a student at Queen's College, Kingston, and is well
