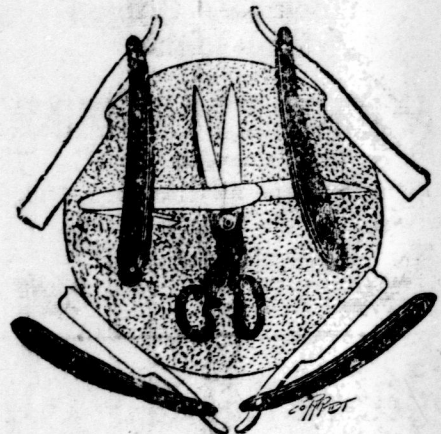

PREPARE FOR THE REUNION

Mr. B. C. McCann is the New President.

August 3, 4 and 5 are the Probable Big Days.

The home guard of the London Old Boys' Association rallied last night, elected new officers and showed such a unanimous desire to have a magnificent reception this year that the success of this year's reunion is assured. The men who do the work were there about 30 in number, and Secretary Bell says that they could not have wished for a better meeting. It is surprising that at this early stage of the game all the more important features which have to do with the organization have been attended to. The date for the homecoming has been practically set, and needs only the sanction of the branches to be a reality. In fact, all the organizations which had been asked in other cities, except one, were willing that the date for the reunion should be Monday Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 3, 4 and 5. London's civic holiday falls on the first of these dates, and as most of the other towns have the same date for their holiday it would be convenient to almost everyone.

The list of officers for the year was changed considerably from that of 1902, although nearly all the same men who held office last year still occupy some position. Mr. Frank Love, police

magistrate, retired from the presidency after holding the post in a most acceptable manner for three years. He was succeeded by Mr. B. C. McCann, who has been one of the organization's hardest workers. Mr. James H. Bell, secretary-treasurer, his services evidently being considered indispensable.

The financial report, which was that of 1901, was the most satisfactory in the association's history. A balance of \$329.54, which was shown in the auditors' report, was the largest sum that has ever been left over, and the members felt thoroughly appreciative of the careful way in which matters had been handled. The disbursements for the year were as follows: Juvenile Opera Company, \$36; military tattoo, \$268.68; banquet, \$39.10; stationery, \$27.92; sports, \$105.15; refreshments, \$60.92; bands, \$80.20.

The receipts included a balance of \$19.56 from 1900 and \$1,982.81 from banquet, juvenile opera company, tattoo at Queen's Park, band concert at Victoria Park, baseball, subscriptions, members' fees, tickets and interest in the bank. This left a balance of \$329.54 to the good.

About \$53 is still against the organization. This was caused by a misapprehension in the association's history. It was found that some members who had promised to subscribe. Some money is still due from members not paid up, and from those who did not cash in money for tickets sold. A motion that the reported be adopted as presented was carried.

ELECTION OF MR. MCCANN. In retiring and proposing Mr. McCann's name, President Love said that as he had held the office for three years it was only fair that someone else should have the honor. It had been exceedingly gratifying to him to see the organization grow to its present standard. Mr. McCann was a member of the association for many years, and he was sure that he was doing the organization a service by proposing him. Mr. McCann thanked the members for the honor done him, which he said he could appreciate more than any other gift which was in the city's power to give. He had had the honor of fostering the organization and he would do all in his power to promote its progress. It was a well-known fact
