MR. CHAMBERLAIN IN AN ACCIDENT

Colonial Secretary Thrown Forward in a Cab.

HIS HEAD BADLY LACERATED

Had His Injuries Dressed at Charing Cross Hospital—Parliament to Meet in Fall.

London, July 7.—The Colonial Secretary, Joseph Chamberlain, was somewhat cut on the head today as the result of a cab accident in Whitehall. His hansom was passing through the Canadian arch, when the horse slipped and Mr. Chamberlain was precipitated forward with great violence. His head struck and shattered the glass front of the cab. When extricated it was seen that his head was badly lacerated and bleeding profusely. A policeman helped the Secretary into a cab and accompanied him to Charing Cross Hospital, where his injuries were dressed.

Mr. Chamberlain's wounds bled a great deal. They were not serious. AN AUTUMN SESSION. In the House of Commons this afternoon, A. J. Balfour, the Government leader, announced that an autumn session of Parliament would be necessary, beginning about the middle of October, and that the house would adjourn early in August.

Replying to a question on the subject of the coronation stands, the First Commissioner of Works, A. Akers Douglas, said that it was hoped they would still be required for the purpose for which they were constructed.

THE "RUSTICATED" CADETS. London, July 7.—Winston Spencer Churchill, Conservative, and Ivor Churchill Guest, Conservative, in the House of Commons today raised the question of the "rustication" of the cadets of the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, as a result of their failure to denounce the persons guilty of starting the recent fire at that institution. The war secretary, Mr. Brodick, after narrating the facts already known, said the rusticated cadets would lose periods of sentence. No charge had been founded against individuals, but the cadets who had left Sandhurst all belonged to companies whose quarters had been set on fire. Some of them had been seen entering a room shortly before one of the fires. There was, therefore, good reason to believe that some of the cadets were implicated in the unfortunate business. The commandant-in-chief, Lord Roberts, considered that the safety of the college demanded the adoption of stringent measures.

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE. The lips of the colonial premiers are sealed while the Imperial conference is in secret session, and they content themselves with the remarks they make when forced into after-dinner oratory. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, warned by the publication of an interview in New York, which he reported to the press, told him that he cannot discuss any question connected with the work of the conference. There is little chance of the colonial premiers or the British Imperialists that any results of great importance will be accomplished, either political or fiscal. Something, however, may be brought about the co-operation of the mother country and the colonies in protecting maritime interests by international subsidies, but the preferential treatment is regarded by the English press as impracticable at present.

The revenue returns have hardened Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's heart and induced the wavering Tories to exclaim: "Let well enough alone, and let the upstart of the colonies do the work of British finance." The hostilities offered to the colonies and the deliberations of the conference will create an atmosphere for Imperial federation, as was done in the jubilee in 1897. The Imperial institutions can hardly be regarded, however, as air-ports; they need solid soil for business interests.

CHOLERA SPREADS. Berlin, July 7.—It is announced here in a dispatch from Port Arthur that cholera is spreading in the city, and that the mortality rate is very great. Out of 336 cases at Inkai 334 were fatal.

CORONATION OF THE KING

Is Likely to Take Place Between August 11 and 15.

His Majesty's Progress More Rapid and Satisfactory Than Expected.

London, July 7.—King Edward will be crowned, between Aug. 11 and Aug. 15. His recovery has been so rapid and satisfactory that the above decision was arrived at today. No official announcement of the fact has yet been made, however. The pageant through the streets and the ceremony at Westminster Abbey will be much curtailed from the original plan. Their majesties will drive from Buckingham Palace to the abbey through the Mall to Whitehall, and thence to the abbey, the same route as taken at the opening of parliament.

A UNIQUE INSTITUTION

Free Sanitarium for Consumptives Formally Opened.

Trustees Rely Upon Large-Hearted People for Its Maintenance.

Gravenhurst, July 6.—The new Free Hospital for Consumptives erected by the National Sanitarium Association, and opened this afternoon in the presence of a large number of the friends of the association. A special train from Toronto brought nearly five hundred persons, who were anxious to display their sympathy with the laudable object which the association has in view.

A CHARMING LOCATION.

The new hospital is about half a mile from the Muskoka Cottage Sanitarium, in a charming and well sheltered location near the shore of Lake Muskoka, whose sparkling and island-studded waters it overlooks.

The building is a substantial and handsome building, resting upon a solid stone foundation. It is as yet not completely furnished, but will, the trustees hope, be shortly. The equipment and appointments are all designed with a view to the comfort and health of the patients, and the hospital is fully equipped with modern accommodation for one hundred patients.

Among the visitors present were Hon. J. H. Strathcona, who made a speech in praise of the hospital, and Mr. W. J. Gage and Mr. W. I. Gage, who were very much pleased with all that he saw. As he had to return by the afternoon train in order to make railway connections for the morning, Mr. Strathcona was unable to take part in the formal proceedings, but before leaving he had congratulated Mr. W. J. Gage and Dr. C. D. Parfitt, the class in charge of the hospital, and had succeeded in providing for the amelioration of the sufferings of those afflicted with disease.

THE FORMAL DEDICATION. Sir Wm. Ralph Meredith, Vice-President of the National Sanitarium Association, presided at the meeting, which was held in the open air.

Sir William, in opening the proceedings, referred to the success attending the operation of the Muskoka Cottage years ago, which had justified the erection of the new consumption hospital. He gave some statistics concerning the parent institution, the cost of which was \$80,000, of which one-half was contributed by Mr. W. J. Gage and Mr. W. I. Gage, and the other half by the association, upon which he had met to celebrate, was designed to meet the need of those sufferers who could not afford to pay anything for treatment within its walls, and who had not means of providing for the treatment necessary.

In conclusion Mr. Gage said: "I think it an honor to have the association, upon which I am glad to have the privilege of joining in the erection of this building, which I would not desire to formally hand over to the board of trustees, with the hope that the hospital may enter upon a career of great usefulness."

Mayor Howland and others made short addresses after which the visitors returned to Toronto by a special train this evening.

GOULDS AFTER ANOTHER SYSTEM

Want Baltimore and Southern as a Connection.

CHANGE IN M.C.R. MANAGEMENT

Assistant General Superintendent Atwater Has Resigned His Position.

Baltimore, July 8.—The Fuller syndicate, representing the Gould system, is negotiating for the Baltimore and Drum Point Railway. This road is 90 miles long and runs from Baltimore to Drum Point. There is 90 feet of water close to the shore at Drum Point, and it is considered the best harbor on the Chesapeake.

The line runs within 20 miles of Washington, and it will be passed by congress authorizing the construction of a line from Conways to the capital. A line from Pittsburgh to connect with the Western Maryland at Shippensburg, via Greensburg and Somerset, is being surveyed by Gould engineers.

A gentleman in close touch with the Goulds stated that J. Pierpont Morgan had agreed to give the Washington and Annapolis line, which would have an entrance into Philadelphia over the Reading tracks from Shippensburg, if this line was built.

The harbor at Drum Point was recently inspected by a commission appointed by the government with the intention of locating a naval coaling station and drydocks there. The commission reported that the place was exactly suited for the purpose, except it lacked railroad facilities.

DOUBLE-TRACKED TO OMAHA.

New York, July 8.—An announcement has been received that the North-western line has just completed its double track from Chicago to Omaha, being the first road to have such facilities between Chicago and the Missouri River gateways. This move not only puts the road in the front rank of western roads, but also puts it somewhat ahead of lines in the eastern and more densely populated district.

The announcement, however, does not sum up the intentions of the western builders, who are bent on making the western service as good as, if not better than, the eastern roads afford. The Northwestern, with the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific, make the announcement that they propose to build a double track road to the Pacific coast, a statement that is a little surprising.

QUITS MICHIGAN CENTRAL.

Detroit, July 8.—A. B. Atwater, assistant general superintendent of the Michigan Central Railroad, has resigned, his resignation taking effect July 1. His place has been filled by the appointment of W. S. Kline, who since last October was assistant to the general superintendent on the Canada division, and resided at St. Thomas.

Mr. Atwater began railroad work when 19 years old, first as telegraph operator on the Cleveland and Lake Erie division of the Grand Trunk, and then as chief engineer of the Stratford and Huron, and then general superintendent of the Georgian Bay and Lake Erie division of the Grand Trunk. In 1892 he became chief engineer of the Chicago and Grand Trunk, and three years later was appointed superintendent of the western division of the C. and G. T. He joined the M. C. R. in 1898.
