

STRENUOUS MEASURES

To Be Adopted in Batangas Province.

Lenient Treatment of Philippine Insurgents Found To Be a Failure.

Fresh Troops To Be Sent to the Islands—Probable Drowning of Eleven Soldiers.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Having failed after two years' strife, in subduing the insurrection in Batangas province, which lies just south of Manila, and having satisfied himself that lenient treatment of insurgents is productive of no good results, Gen. J. Franklin Bell, the military commander in that province, has determined on the enforcement of the law in the most vigorous and determined fashion, involving reconcentration in a modified form, the application of martial law in all directions, and the unrelenting pursuit and punishment of the natives who act as spies and traitors to the United States. All this appears in a long report to the war department just published.

FRESH TROOPS.—Washington, Jan. 20.—Orders were issued Saturday by Lieut.-Gen. Miles, involving an extensive movement of troops between the United States and the Philippines. Troops to the number of 1,500, stationed in the United States, are ordered to service in the division of the Philippines. This general movement of troops is for the purpose of replacing the men who have had long service in the Philippines, with an equal number of fresh troops from the home stations. ELEVEN SOLDIERS PROBABLY DROWNED.

Manila, Jan. 20.—A report has been received here that a dug-out canoe, in which eleven men of the Company I, of the Second Infantry, were traveling, is missing, and probably lost. It is believed the men either perished or were captured. An important capture was made in Laguna Province, Luzon, when eight men of the Eighth Infantry captured a large insurgent named Apudka Kahabagan. He recently commanded an insurgent force of 800 men, 300 of whom carried rifles, while 500 were armed with bolos, and for six years past he has been leading insurgent bands against the Spaniards and the Americans.

SHOT HIS FRIEND

Sad Accident Near Innkeeper—Joseph Bray the Victim.

Woodstock, Jan. 18.—A shooting accident took place near Innkeeper Friday, which has resulted in the death of a young farmer named Joseph Bray. He had come to the cheese factory near the village with his milk, and while there he and an employee named Leslie Wilson noticed an owl up a tree. They started after it, and Wilson discharged one of the barrels and then, forgetting that the other one was loaded, lowered it and accidentally touched the trigger. The charge entered Bray's knee. He was standing about sixteen feet away. The knee bone was broken, the thigh bone shattered, and the flesh terribly torn. Doctors were summoned from the city and an amputation was made, but the young man died from the shock of the operation and from loss of blood two hours after the accident. He leaves a wife.

WILL FIGHT FOR THEIR HAIR.

Minneapolis, Jan. 20.—If the government shall insist that the Indians in its charge shall cut off their long hair, abstain from the use of paint and the gaudy ornaments of savagery, the aborigines will dig up the hatchet and shed their blood in the resisting of so sudden a wiping out of racial characteristics. This is the opinion of J. B. Bottineau, son of Pierre Bottineau, a northwestern pioneer and scout.

PANAMA CANAL OFFER INDORSED.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The supplemental report of the Isthmian Canal commission on the proposition of the Panama Canal Company to dispose of its property to the United States for \$40,000,000, was delivered to President Roosevelt Saturday evening. The members of the commission refuse to discuss the nature of the report, and like reference was maintained at the White House, but it was stated on excellent authority that the report unanimously recommends that the offer of the Panama Company be accepted. It will be laid before congress at once.

PEEPING TOM ON HORSEBACK.

Boston, Jan. 20.—There is a lone horseback rider in the Back Bay for whom the police are looking. It is usually on Sunday mornings that this rider passes through the wide alleys in the rear of Back Bay houses. He sits erect and walks his horse. His eyes are riveted on the windows which line either side of the alleys, the time is usually when women are arising and dressing. SUPT. FRANKLIN'S STARTLING ANSWERS

Showing Where the Responsibility for the New York Central Tunnel Horror Rests.

New York, Jan. 20.—Coroner's inquest on the sixteen victims of the recent collision in the New York Central's Park street tunnel, is in progress. Terminal Superintendent Franklin's evidence bore heavily against the directors of the road. Here are his admissions. The questions are by District Attorney Jerome, the answers by Mr. Franklin.

Q.—What do the engineers tell you in explanation of being late?
A.—They say that they cannot see the lights and know very well they can't. On foggy days the signals are obstructed. On a winter day they can be seen only at a slight distance from the road. Here are the answers to the questions asked on the day of the accident?
Q.—Was the green signal obscured that morning from five to ten seconds?
A.—I can't say ten—probably five.

Q.—Has any engineer ever complained to you? How many complaints were made to you in 1907?
A.—A good many—I can't say.

Q.—What have you done to improve the signals?
A.—Nothing except to talk of changing the signals and making block sections shorter.

Q.—Did you ever hear of his (Wilson's) running into the station (the collision) on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad?
A.—No.
Q.—If a man can't see the signals, then he has to feel his way by the instinct borne of long experience?
A.—Yes.
Q.—And that experience is not born in a day?
A.—No, it isn't!

HON. JAS. SUTHERLAND

Receiving Congratulations of His Constituents on His Appointment.

Woodstock, Jan. 20.—Hon. James Sutherland, minister of marine and fisheries, who has arrived home from Ottawa, is receiving the hearty congratulations of his constituents upon his new honors. The member wears his honors with all his accustomed modesty.

As already announced, his acceptance of the portfolio renders an election in the north necessary, and nomination will be held at the court house on the 29th inst., at between 12 and 2 o'clock. Sutherland is acting as returning officer. On this occasion Mr. Sutherland hopes to meet many of the representative electors of the constituency as can possibly make it convenient to be present. He will then take occasion to place before them an account of his stewardship and will have with him one or two of the leading men of the Liberal party from the north to deliver addresses on the work of the Laurier administration.

WESTERN ONTARIO

Live Items Culled for Busy People's Information.

G. H. Barnes has been appointed night operator at the G. T. R. depot at Stratford, A. Lamont being transferred to the depot at Kingscourt Junction. Henry Morand, treasurer of Essex county, on Saturday gave security for the advance in his salary, amounting to \$1,789.96. The council accepted a note for the full amount, endorsed by Paul Morand, Treasurer, and Clarence Mason, of Sandwich. The note is made payable Feb. 28, Morand asking for this length of time in which to raise the money.

At a meeting of the Sarnia public library board Thursday evening, a resolution was passed acknowledging the receipt of Andrew Carnegie's communication, and also a resolution for a library building. A resolution was also passed recommending the council to grant a site for the new building on Victoria Square. Options on several properties for sites have been secured by the library board.

The death is announced on Saturday morning at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Arthur Arnum, St. Thomas, of William Mason, her only brother. The deceased was 32 years of age. He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Arnum and Mrs. Thos. Pellow. Mr. Mason was a stepson of George Harland, Grand Trunk engineer, and died at one time a fireman on the G. T. R., and afterwards a brakeman on the M. & E. He left St. Thomas eight years ago for the Western States. He returned to St. Thomas about six weeks ago, but died of pneumonia, unexpected. His parents are both dead. The deceased was born in Montreal.

W. H. Allan, collector of customs at Windsor, will be promoted to the position of inspector of customs, and Wm. McCreath will take his place as collector. The recent death of Mr. Boulbee left the inspectorship vacant, and it has been expected for some time that Mr. Allan would receive the position. It is probable that J. H. Kenning will succeed James Gow, inspector of distilleries superannuated. The two vacancies thus created in the inland revenue office will be filled, and it is understood that the appointments of P. M. Keogh and A. J. E. Belleperche will be granted.

Decease rather suddenly to Mr. Edward McCallum, of lot 23, second range north, Elfrida. On a recent evening he was taken ill, and in a few minutes he was dead. He was a well-known man in the community, and had just finished his work for the night. He was found by the snow off his boots, after coming to the house that he "would not take a dollar and go to Clarence tonight." Just then he was stricken with paralysis, and never regained consciousness, dying at 4 o'clock next morning. Mr. McCallum, who was in his 55th year and unmarried, was generally respected for his quiet, unassuming habits. He leaves an aged mother, two brothers and one sister.

Crothers & Price, solicitors for George A. Gilbert, one of the candidates for councillor at the recent municipal elections in the township of Yorkmouth, have secured an appointment for a recount of the ballots, to be held on Thursday next, at 10 o'clock.

The committee appointed by the St. Thomas Trades and Labor Council to inquire into the alleged irregularities in connection with the recount in the election there, reported to the Trades and Labor Council on Thursday night that they had made an examination of the poll books, and had obtained therefrom a certified copy of the names of persons who had voted more than once. The list includes some 118 names of persons who had voted from two to four times. The list also found that some of the returning officers had not kept their poll books properly. Upon the evidence thus obtained they had called in a lawyer, and had obtained advice to the effect that the returning officers had violated the election law, and had also laid themselves liable for a criminal offense, persons who had voted more than once. A discussion of the evidence took place, the council deciding that, in the interest of justice, the matter ought to be dealt with through the courts, and a committee was appointed to enter action.

A LOCOMOTIVE BOILER BURSTS

Two Trainmen Killed and Others Injured.

Carrie Nation Crippled—Drops Her Hatchet and Loses a Toe—Man Ground to Fragments.

TRAINMAN KILLED.

Victor, Iowa, Jan. 20.—As the Denver limited passenger train, No. 5, of the Rock Island, was passing through this town at full speed Saturday morning, the boiler of the engine exploded, resulting in the death of the engineer and fireman and slightly injuring two porters and a brakeman. The killed are W. Williams, of Brooklyn, Iowa, engineer; E. Hoar, of Valley Junction, Iowa, fireman. The force of the explosion threw the seven coaches of the train from the track. The passengers were uninjured. The causes leading up to the explosion will never be known, owing to the death of the engineer and fireman. Williams, the dead engineer, had been in the service of the Rock Island Company for 23 years.

TERRIFIC SMASH!

Parkersburg, W. Va., Jan. 19.—Two freight trains met in a head-on collision on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, six miles north of here today, killing the engineer and fireman of one train and injuring the brakeman on each train. Ten cars were hurled up and both engines were demolished.

GROUND TO FRAGMENTS.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 20.—George M. Wahl, a lumber salesman, aged 45 years, while crossing the Vincent street bridge, of the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg Railway, was struck by a train and literally ground to fragments.

CARRIE IS CRIPPLED.

Topeka, Kan., Jan. 20.—Mrs. Carrie Nation, while flourishing a large hatchet from an elevated platform, during firm, dropped it, and the keen edge of the instrument severed the large toe of her right foot.

SIX MEN HURT.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—While engaged, Saturday laying a section of concrete in the new Palace Hotel, six men fell with the part of the floor on which they were working onto the next floor, a distance of eighteen feet. All were bruised and shaken, and James Spencer, one of the number, had his jaw broken and sustained internal injuries that may result in his death.

KILLED BY A CAVE-IN.

New York, Jan. 19.—Patrick Logue was killed by a cave-in today in a sand bank today in the basement of the new stock exchange building on Broad street. The body was found by Perry T. O'Rourke, foreman of the gang of men, was placed under arrest under a charge of criminal negligence.

TWO SUICIDES.

Linwood, Ont., Jan. 18.—Henry Brenner, a wealthy and highly respected farmer living near this place, committed suicide this morning by hanging himself in his drive shed. Deceased had been unbalanced in mind for some time.

MINER'S FATAL FALL.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 19.—Maurice Quinlan, single, a miner, fell under a moving train at Gladstone, N. S., yesterday and met instant death. He was screening coal into the cars when the accident occurred.

IN DEADLY PERIL.

Boston, Jan. 18.—Cut off from access to a fire escape, a few feet away, Mrs. Helen M. York and John Blau, a linotype operator, stood in a window of the fourth floor of a Milton Place building tonight, with flames roaring below and behind them. Slowly as it seemed the firemen raised a long ladder until the top rung reached the window, where Mrs. York was trying to keep her feet when taking fire. The man beside her helped her to step on the ladder; then, through smoke and flame, both of them descended in safety to the street. Douglas was the most thrilling fire incident in Boston for many months. Loss, somewhat over \$50,000. The building was occupied by Skinner, Kidd & Co., printers; Stone, Forsyth & Co., paper dealers; and Stewart, Howard & Co., storage of electrical goods.

OTHER CASUALTIES.

John W. Gane, Peterson, miners, lost their lives in the May B mine, Victor, Col., while being lowered in a bucket to the bottom of a shaft. They were overcome by gas. Both men were about 30 years of age and single.

Chas. Howard, a laborer, was struck by a sliding beam in the iron mine, Manchester, Frador in St. John, N. B., Friday and knocked head-foremost into the hold. He received injuries from which he died a few minutes later. He leaves a widow and three children.

Deaths of a Day.

Rome, Jan. 18.—Philippe Marchetti, the Italian musical composer, author of "Ruy Blas," died yesterday, of cancer. He was born in 1832.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Jan. 20.—Ernest Victor Clergue, of the Canadian Soo, brother of Francis H. Clergue, who is at the head of the big industrial tract here, died in Chicago on Thursday night of heart trouble. He was 41 years of age, and had been prominently identified with the work here.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—J. G. Moylan, who for many years was inspector of penitentiaries, but who was superannuated about eight years ago, when Douglas Stewart got his place, died Saturday night. He was over 70 years of age.

New York, Jan. 19.—Peter Cassidy, S. J., died this morning of pneumonia, after a long illness. He was born in Ireland and taught at St. Francis Xavier's, St. John's, Boston College, Georgetown University, and was president of St. Peter's College in Jersey City for three years. He spent the last four years of his life in missionary work in Canada and this country.

Oswego, N. Y., Jan. 20.—Mrs. Ellen Collins, the widow of a former county clerk, died suddenly here Saturday. She was credited with being 106 years of age.

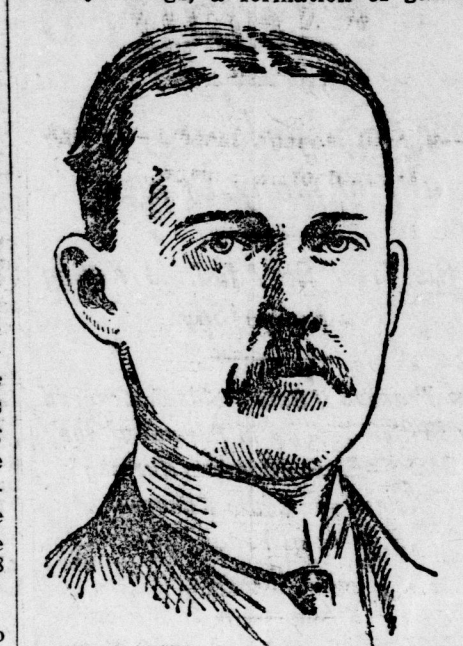

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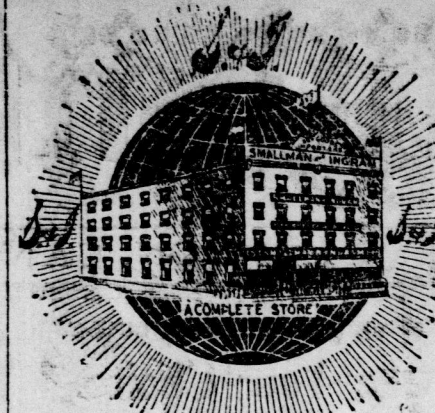

THE METHODIST CHURCH AND PROHIBITION.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: In your editorial of last evening you mention "the most prominent and responsible members of the Methodist Church" in a connection that would almost justify the inference that they are in favor of a referendum. Last year your editorial, following as it does the published opinions of a few Methodist divines who speak approvingly of that course of political action, should lead some of your readers to that conclusion, allow me to put before them what is the declared attitude of the Methodist Church on the matter of prohibition.

In the declaration of principle adopted by our last general conference, of which I had the honor to be a member, are the following:

"(1) That the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is immoral and it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit it.
"(2) That the liquor traffic is a business antagonistic to every interest of the church and the state.
"(3) That we condemn the license feature of all statutes by which money is accepted for the legal protection of an immoral traffic.

"(4) That civil righteousness demands the extirpation of a traffic so fruitful of corruption in every department of civil government. And the time has come when all good citizens should unite for harmonious and aggressive action at the ballot box to secure this end."

Since the general conference is the only body that can speak authoritatively for the Methodist Church, and that body adopted the above principles unanimously, it would be quite misleading to infer that the Methodist Church is in doubt about the ripeness of the country for a prohibitory law. A referendum on this question is at best a policy of delay in bringing about what the Methodist Church has demanded as an immediate duty from the government. To take the responsibility for such legislation from the shoulders of the government and place it upon the people—as a referendum
