## DELHI'S DURBAR **OPENED WITH POMP**

The Viceroy, Lord Kurzon of Kedleston, Makes His State Entry Into Delhi.

Delhi, India, Dec. 29.-The Viceroy, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, made his state entry this morning into the capital of the Moguls. This constituted the official opening of the durbar held to celebrate the accession of King Edward as Emperor of India.

It was a splendid pageant, probably unparalleled in its magnificence. At the head of the elephant procession rode Lord and Lady Curzon, on the state "Grand Tusker," 12 feet high, the largest elephant in India. Their howdah was decked with gold and silver, and the elephant itself was almost hidden beneath a gold-worked addlecloth. Surrounding them were cottnen in scarlet and gold liveries, and bearing massive silver staves.

The Duke of Connaught, who represented King Edward, and the Duchess of Connaught followed. Their elephant was equally gorgeously caparisoned. Then, in order of precedence, came the Nizam of Hyderabad, the Maharajah of Travancore, and other ruling chiefs, 70 in all, with the huge elephants forming a line a quarter of a mile in length. This glittering procession started from the railroad station, preceded by Dragoon Guards and artillery, the Viceroy's escort, and by heralds and trumpeters. The route was entirely lined by British and native

was entrepy linea by British and harve troops.

The cortege passed in front of a magnificent line of 150 elephants, which bore the brilliantly-dressed retainers of the ruling chiefs. The beasts all saluted by trumpeting and throwing their trunks in the air, presenting a truly imposing sight, and afterward fell in behind the official procession. Huge crowds of onlookers witnessed the spectacle, which, it is claimed, never has been surpassed in magnificence even in this country of Oriental splendor. Oriental splendor.
