WESTERN POINTS OF THE PROVINCE

Good Showing Made by Delaware Cheese Factory.

OVER 1,500,000 LBS. MILK USED

Dunwich Farm of 100 Acres Sold for \$10,000—Good Prices Secured for Cattle.

The East Lambton Tribune has started on its fourth year.

George Vannere, night constable at Dundas, has been appointed chief constable at Simcoe.

Mr. Joseph McKee has sold his farm, lot 6, con. 11, Kinsredine, to Mr. Robert Carleton, of Bruce; \$5,000 was the price paid.

The bylaw to take \$25,000 of stock in the Huron, Bruce and Grey Electric Railway was defeated in Colborne Township by four votes.

Lucan Sentinel: A large wildcat was caught in a trap on Mr. Pierce's farm in Kinloss one night this week. It was a very fine specimen.

The Bruce County treasurer reported the receipts for 1922 to be \$70,865.68, and the expenditures \$72,815.22, leaving a balance of \$2,050.46.

A T. L. E. and P. Railway train ran into eight feet of snow the other day at Salford, and nearly a day was spent in cutting a way through.

The Parkhill chief of police is paid \$220 a year, and his duties are very onerous. From arresting a burglar to cutting this on the back streets.

At the annual meeting of the patrons and shareholders of the Pullman cheese and butter factory, Mr. Will Stacey was re-elected as cheesemaker.

Mr. Alf Stewart, Monkton, sold a 2-year-old cow last week for \$125. Mr. Thos. Ellacott also sold one of the same age for \$100. It pays to raise good horses.

Mr. John Waterworth, ex-M.P. for North Middlesex, died at his home in the county, is very low with dropsy, and no hopes are entertained of his recovery.

While returning from doing some shopping last week, Mr. John Dale, of the west ward, slipped on an icy walk and fractured one of his arms above the wrist.

The Parkhill Methodist Church is now entirely free of debt, the mortgage on it having been paid in full recently. This condition of affairs reflects much credit on the congregation.

The 11th Regiment Gun Club has been undertaken to feed the ducks that remain in the marsh all winter. It is estimated to require 50 bushels of grain, of which 30 have been donated.

The marriage of Miss Pauline B. Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Johnson, Port Dover, to Mr. Ernest Reynolds, of Buffalo, formerly of New York, is announced to take place in March.

Mrs. John Frost, aged 57, died on Friday night of bronchitis. She went to Owen Sound in 1845, and was the third white woman to arrive in the settlement, where she had lived almost continuously since.

The quarterly official board of Main Street Methodist Church, Exeter, has unanimously extended an invitation to Rev. W. Godwin, of Grace Church, St. Thomas, to preach at the church on the 20th.

At the annual meeting of the Wingham Presbyterian Church, the report stated that the contributions for the year amounted to \$2,173.43. The salary of the pastor, Rev. J. P. Pennington, has been increased from \$1,000 to \$1,200.

Mr. Douglass McCole, who recently purchased the Hawley farm, tenth concession of all concerned, has sold the timber on twelve acres to Mr. Neil Watson, Mull, for \$1,125. This leaves the net cost of the farm to him at a low rate.

Few parents have been more sorely afflicted than Mr. and Mrs. John Muir, of the west ward, Mitchell. They had two daughters, bright, intelligent children, and within a few days both were carried off by malignant scarlet fever.

Messrs. Prior and Armstrong, of Exeter, two of the most extensive hog shippers in these parts, during the month of January shipped 1,041 hogs, aggregating in weight 218,536 pounds, and for which they have paid the farmers of the immediate vicinity \$12,250.

Mr. Henry Kleber, Monkton, has sold his farm, containing 140 acres, to Mr. A. Stewart, from near Willow Grove, for the sum of \$4,000. Mr. Kleber gives possession the first week in March. He intends going out west to look for land for his sons.

Proclamations are out for the nominations of school trustees for St. George's ward, Clinton, to take the place of R. Rowland, resigned. Nominations will be held in the town hall on Monday evening, the 22nd, and if necessary an election will take place a week later.

A hitch has occurred in the construction of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway Company's extension of their line to Amherstburg. It was reported in Windsor that the M. C. R. had secured an injunction to restrain the Windsor company from crossing their bridge near Amherstburg.

The reports at the annual meeting of All Saints' Presbyterian Church were encouraging. The pastor's stipend had been contributed, with a goodly balance over. The W. P. M. S. showed receipts of \$165 and the Sunbeam Mission Band of \$142, both reports including value of clothing sent to the Northwest.

At the annual meeting of the Lambton County Medical Association, held in Watford, there was a fair representation of the profession present. The following officers were elected: President, Dr. J. P. Hubbard, Forest; vice-president, Dr. A. J. Fisher, Bridport; secretary-treasurer, Dr. Thomas Wickett, Watford.

Knox Church, Goderich, held a successful annual meeting. During the year 56 names have been added to the church roll. The ordinary contributions exceeded those of last year by \$225. Total receipts were \$5,309.93, of which \$929 goes to missions. The congregation have undertaken to support of a missionary in the Northwest.

At the annual meeting of the Tavistock cheese and butter factory, the report showed that 107 tons of cheese had been sold at an average of 10.55 cents per pound. Over 10 tons of butter were made, the price averaging over 21 cents.

The last year was a successful one, and the patrons and Messrs. Ballantyne & Bell are to be congratulated.

Mr. Joseph W. Dunn, of Dunn, sold his splendid farm of 100 acres, being lot No. 11, in the second concession of Dunwich, about four miles north of Dunn, for \$10,000. This is probably the best farm in the township, and has over sixteen miles of tile in the ground, good condition.

Mr. Bowman, of Aldborough, is the purchaser.

A quiet wedding took place in Sarnia on Wednesday, Feb. 14, at 11 o'clock in the morning, when Mrs. Martha Phillips became the wife of Mr. David Calvert, of Watford. Rev. Mr. Fossant officiated.

Little Matty Phillips was attractively pretty as a flower girl. Mr. and Mrs. Calvert will make their home in Watford.

At the Blenheim Board of Trade meeting on Thursday evening, Messrs. F. McLean and A. Deane reported that a canning factory would be well suited to the town, and should be promptly established. It was decided that the town council should be asked to submit a bylaw to grant a bonus of \$2,000, provided a company could be formed to go into the business.

Hugh A. Carmichael, of West Lorne, who is forming a company for the manufacture of gasoline engines, offers to locate in St. Thomas, provided that a bonus of \$25,000 is granted for the return for the money consideration the company would remain there for five years, operating the plant, and possibly from fifteen to twenty, during that time.

Mr. Dunkley has struck a good water and gas well at the dairy farm, third concession of Harwich. He has the gas piped into his dwelling house, where he uses it both for heating and lighting. He also uses the gas for heating his greenhouse. The water which flows from the well often contains quantities of oil, but whether oil in paying quantities can be secured in that section is not yet known.

At a special meeting of the Presbyterian Church, the resignation of R. S. G. Anderson as pastor of the Presbyterian Church, and the appointment of a new clerk were considered. Mr. Anderson's resignation was accepted.

A number of young men near Chatham went out the other night to charity for a newly-married couple, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Erskine, who were being entertained at the house of John Erskine.

The tables were set for the wedding of the young man, who was not attired for company, and he was badly into the house, where he was compelled to occupy a prominent position in the festive gathering which took place on March 2.

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BRITAIN ISSUES**A BLUE BOOK**

Revealing Interesting Facts About Venezuelan Dispute.

U. S. CONSUL IN A BAD LIGHT

Herbert Tells of His Disagreement With Bowen, Who Was Hard To Pull With.

London, Feb. 17.—A blue book on the Venezuelan dispute was issued this evening.

The most interesting dispatch in the book is an official letter from the former British minister at Caracas, W. H. D. Haggard, to former Minister Lansdowne, dated Trinidad, Dec. 30, concerning the alleged illegal detention of the British schooner Harry Troop by the Venezuelan Government, in an unqualified place, from May to November, 1902, whereby the crew were decimated by dysentery. Mr. Haggard says in this letter: "I regret to say that it would appear that I placed too much faith on the complete accuracy of the statement of the secretary of the United States legation, W. W. Russell, as to the improvement in the conditions of the Harry Troop, etc., when he said that the crew were decimated by dysentery. These statements may probably be accounted for by the facts, which appear undoubtedly, that Mr. Bowen was most anxious, for reasons too much for me to say, to report the conduct of the Venezuelan authorities in the most favorable light possible, and that he had inspired his subordinate in the same way. I did not put it briefly, Mr. Russell did not dare to say a word outside the legation contrary to President Castro's mode of proceeding."

Another noteworthy dispatch is Sir Michael Herbert's report to Minister Lansdowne, on his disagreement with Mr. Bowen, dated Jan. 29. The British ambassador says in this report: "The German charge d'affaires, and I called tonight on Mr. Bowen. I informed him that we were forced to reckon with public opinion in England, and that it might be necessary to fall back on the international tribunal at The Hague. We were unable to obtain a satisfactory answer from Mr. Bowen, who was very evasive. He ultimately made a statement in reply in the following terms: 'I object to paying first the claims of the allied powers and the claims of the other nations against Venezuela. I think it is unjust, unfair and illegal to tie the hands of the said other nations for a period of five or six years, that it would take to pay the claims of the allied powers. I recognize that brute force alone can be respected in the collections of claims. I should encourage the said other nations to use force also. Thirdly, if the allied powers wanted preferential treatment they still have asked for it at the beginning.'"

The beginning of the blue book is taken up with lengthy details from British subjects in support of their claims against Venezuela for compensation for outrages, and Venezuela's counter protests with regard to the case of the steamer San Righ.
