SIR CHARLES DILKE'S VIEWS REGARDING PEACE

Has Not the Slightest Doubt on the Subject.

British Make an Unsuccessful Attack on the Enemy.

Remarkable Escape of a Boer Prisoner—Boers Lost 373 Men During the Past Week.

London, April 22.—Sir Charles Dilke is one of the most laborious and best-informed members of the commons. I have asked him whether he thinks that peace will be made before the corona-tion. His reply is: "I have not the slightest doubt on the subject. Peace will be made if it has not been done virtually already. I have not had any doubt respecting the result since the conference with the Boer leaders began. Their departure to confer with the burghers confirms my opinion." Sir Charles Dilke added that he did not believe that the European Boer agents had been dealt with by the govern-ment, but they might have been dealt with by the delegates attending the conference in South Africa.

PEACE EXPECTED IN JUNE.
Sir Charles Dilke, without doubt, re-flects the opinions of members of the house, which is more optimistic and better informed than the opinion out-side. It is conceded generally by mem-bers that the Boer leaders have reach-ed a tentative agreement with Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner, that they have returned to the commandos as

'MORGANIZING' THE GREAT TRAFFIC OF THE ATLANTIC

Creates Perturbation in Great Britain.

Morgan Will Finance London's Underground Railway.

Protest From Cobden Club Against Duty on Grain—Big Fire in Old London.

TO MUCH MORGAN.

London, April 22.—What is called the "Morganizing" of the greater section of the Atlantic ferry is causing con-siderable perturbation in Great Brit-ain. The Westminster Gazette sug-gests it may be entitled to the grave attention of the government, as, in some quarters it is insisted that the "vital interests of the empire in time of war may be jeopardized by the new arrangement," and almost in the same breath the paper reiterates the state-ment used when the first combination was first mooted, that it would be a powerful peace factor between America and Great Britain, for the great American financiers would find it to their own interests to use their influ-ence against war between the two countries.

J. Pierpont Morgan will finance to the extent of several millions a new underground railway in London, which will rival Charles T. Yerkes' scheme of obtaining possession of all the inter-rail transportation of London. The Conservative agent for the city of London, Kent and Greenwich. CAUSE OF DROP IN SILVER.

London, April 22.—Financial experts in London explain that the fall in the price of silver to the lowest point on record today, was caused by the fact that China, instead of buying silver as usual at this time of the year, is sell-ing in order to pay the war indemnity in gold. It is generally believed that the fall in the price of silver would not have occurred had London sup-ported the market. This, coupled with the fact that the United States is sell-ing, caused the decline, which is now believed to have reached the minimum price.

CABLE NOTES.

The cholera situation in the Philip-pines shows a total of 383 cases and 263 deaths in Manila, and 546 cases and 602 deaths in the provinces.

Gen. Pufino, with 26 officers and 275 soldiers, has surrendered to the native Philippine constabulary in the province of Misamis, in Mindanao.

Colombian government troops, under Gen. Pinzon, are on the way to Bogotá de Toro to attack the insur-gents.

MIDDLESEXES ARE ALL IN LINE

Toronto Globe's Survey of Political Situation Here.

Increased Majority in North Riding—Enthusiasm for Dr. Routledge—The Local Contest.

In a review of the political situation in Ontario, the Toronto Globe has the following regarding the position of affairs in London and the Middlesexes:

"The decision to make the coming provincial general election campaign a short one commends itself to all parties. In the city of London the prospect is that there will be a three-cornered fight. The prohibitionists met last night in Somerset Hall and nominated Mr. Fred W. Daly as their candidate. Mr. Daly is a popular member, Col. F. B. Leys, whose open-hearted, open-handed generosity has made friends for him among all parties. The possession of large means only em-phasizes the fact that he has no snobbery whatever in his disposition. The Con-servative party may have some difficulty in getting a candidate to oppose Col. Leys. It is admitted that Mayor Beck has no inclination to run, and Mr. Isaac Water-man repudiates any desire to enter politi-cal life. He would be the strongest candidate. Mr. John Forestal is men-tioned, and also ex-Mayor John D. Wil-son. Mr. Wilson is more likely to be persuaded to run than any of those men-tioned. The Liberals are united, and confident that Col. Leys can defeat any Conservative candidate who may in-due stand, by as large a majority as he defeated Mayor Beck four years ago. The prohibition candidate is not taken seri-ously.

THE MIDDLESEXES.

"In North Middlesex the sitting mem-ber, Mr. W. H. Taylor, will carry the riding by an increased majority. Con-servatives posted in the chances concede this. In East Middlesex Dr. Routledge is expected to defeat Capt. Robson, the present member. Both are popular, but Dr. Routledge carries with him and has aroused in the Reform party a feeling that he will succeed. This, coupled with the splendid organization now existing, gives substantial grounds for victory.

"In West Middlesex the premier is safe. Any riding honored with a representative such as the Hon. George W. Ross would be foolish to change for his opponent. They seek no change, and are proud of the premier and proud of the position to which he has risen. The county of Mid-dlesex and the city of London giving him an undivided support in the next parlia-ment."

AMENDMENTS TO YUKON ACT

Introduced in the House by Hon. Mr. Sifton.

The Cattleguards Bill Bowled Out in Committee.

Ottawa, April 21.—This was an in-teresting private members' day ending with a three-hours' discussion on Mr. Lanoe's railway crossing guards bill, which was lost in the committee stage.

YUKON TERRITORY BILL.

Hon. Clifford Sifton introduced his bill to further amend the Yukon Ter-ritory act. The first clause removed any chance of friction by providing that when there is a conflict between ordinances passed by the governor in council and the commissioner in coun-cil, the ordinance from the governor in council shall prevail. The second clause gives the local council of the Yukon control and regulation of the sale of intoxicating liquor in the ter-ritory, but does not affect the question of the manufacture of liquor in the territory. The third clause makes an im-portant change in connection with the local council of the territory. It is the view of the government, he said, that matters have now reached a stage that a further measure of representa-tive government may be extended to the Yukon Territory, and, therefore, this clause provides that, in accordance with the application of the Yukon coun-cil, instead of two elective representa-tives on the council, there shall here-after be five. In reply to Mr. R. L. Borden, Mr. Sifton stated that the council will be composed of five elect-ive and five appointed members. The last clause, which deals with the ques-tion of the governor in council impos-ing a tax in that territory, nad, Mr. Sifton explained, been drafted in error, and he would ask to amend it at the second reading.

AMEND ALLEN LABOR ACT.

Mr. Ralph Smith introduced a bill to amend the Allen Labor Act. Its object is to transfer jurisdiction under the act from the minister of justice to the minister of labor. It passed it will make it clear that, notwithstanding the right of private prosecution, it shall still be the duty of the govern-

THE CATTLEGUARD BILL.

In the course of the discussion Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that there was undoubtedly a grievance under the report of the railway committee, which Mr. Lanoe was proposing to in-quire, which recommended that the bill be not proceeded with. Mr. Lanoe, the premier reviewed the promise of Mr. Blair, that during the recess the govern-ment would cause an expert in-quiry into the matter, and that the matter would be dealt with next year.
