34,470 BOOKS IN CIRCULATION

Librarian Carson's Report Submitted at the Meeting of the Public Library Board.

The regular meeting of the public library board was held last evening. A report presented by Librarian Carson showed that during the first quarter of the present year the number of books in circulation was 34,470, an increase of 9,982 over the same period last year. The departments of juvenile literature, sociology, history, natural science and reference works, show the largest increases. Up to March 31 515 applications for membership were granted, an increase of 27 over the first quarter of last year.
