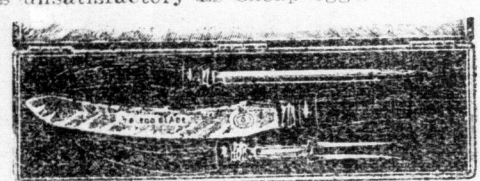

New York, Nov. 11.—At a dinner last night, attended by members of the volunteer committee of one thousand men and women organized to raise in a fortnight by subscription a \$4,000,000 fund for the Young Men's and Young Women's

Christian Associations of Greater New York, it was announced that pledges made yesterday, the first day, amounted to \$1,886,746. Among the largest contributors to the fund were John D. Rockefeller, \$250,000; Mrs. Willard D. Straight (formerly Miss Dorothy Whitney), \$200,000; Cleveland H. Dodge and Miss Grace Dodge, \$250,000 each; Mrs. Finley J. Shepard (formerly Miss Helen Good), \$200,000. There were several donations each of \$50,000 and \$25,000.

COMMITTEE INDORSES EARLY CLOSING LAW

Industrial Section of Men's Federation on Expresses Favorable Attitude.

At a meeting of the industrial committee of the Men's Federation held Monday night, the question of early closing came up for consideration as the result of a communication received from the Ministerial Association. The matter was sent by the unanimous indorsement of the committee to the federation executive. The members present were: Messrs. H. B. Ashplant, Col. Gartsshore, Mr. Robert Greene, Mr. F. W. Daly, Dr. W. A. Riddell and H. W. Lyons (secretary).

At the suggestion of Mr. Ashplant, chairman, the following questions were submitted to Dr. W. A. Riddell for answer, during the survey:

1. Surveyed from the viewpoint of Christ's teaching, do you find the industrial relationships in London conform to the requirements of the Christian religion in practice?
2. If your answer to the above is negative, can you indicate the line of departure from Christianity in practice?
3. Do you find the industrial situation in London indicates the presence of the same general economic practice at the base of our local conditions as characterizes the industrial life of other cities of the same size or do you find our local conditions peculiar to London?
4. Do you find industrial conditions in London warrant a belief that if these conditions are allowed by the Christian church to work out their natural social products, our industrial practice will develop the same acute problems that now press for solution in the larger cities?

MOTHER DRESSED ERRING BOY IN GIRL'S CLOTHES

This Proved an Effective Means of Keeping Incurable Youngster in the House—Board Decides To Give Him a Fresh Chance.

The experiment of changed surroundings, new companions and another school, to reform the little "Fagin" reported by Principal Ashplant, of Rectory street school, will be tried by Public School Inspector C. B. Edwards. At the last session of the board Principal Ashplant reported an 11-year-old boy of his school, whom he had suspended. He declared that the boy was not only a truant and a thief, but that he was taking smaller boys and teaching them to steal for him. He asked that the young incorrigible be expelled.

Give the Boy a Chance.
When the question was brought before the finance committee of the board on Monday afternoon a transfer of schools was suggested. It will be tried out rather than imposing the extreme penalty of suspension.

A rather amusing incident in connection with this affair was reported.

When the truant officer called at the boy's home to make an investigation he found the lad's mother had adopted the rather unusual method of dressing him in girl's clothes to prevent him making his exit from the house and running loose on the streets during the time of his suspension.

It Kept Him Home.
Rather than face the ridicule of the other boys, the lad preferred to remain within the confines of his own house when clothed in the humiliating raiment of his sister.

Another incident hardly of the same character, however, was brought up, and that was the story of how he and a companion escaped from the clutches of the law at the last Western Fair. Both were arrested for theft. By one of them diverting the attention of the officer who made the arrest both were able to make their "get-aways."

UNLIKELY THAT TWO COLLEGIATES WILL BE ERECTED

Cost and Difficulty of Location May Confirm Board's Attitude.

Views of the Principal

Mr. Rogers in Favor of Separate Schools, but Board Adheres to Original View.

When the question of new colleges comes before the board of education, at its special session to be held shortly to consider the matter, there seems to be little doubt but that the trustees will reiterate their previous motion and decide on one Collegiate only. Last spring when the much-debated question of having a second Collegiate in the city was brought before the board, the question was almost settled by practically a unanimous vote in favor of the single unit.

Principal Favors Two.
At the last session of the board the entire question was reopened. G. F. Rogers, the new principal of the Collegiate, when asked by the board for an expression of opinion, pointed out the fact that London should build for the future as well as for the present, and for that reason commended the attention of the trustees to the advisability of two schools. It was this that led the board to reopen the question, but the general consensus of opinion now is that the single school idea will be the one adopted.

Where To Build It, the Rub.
Cost is one of the drawbacks that the opponents of two schools are pointing out. Location is another. East London, North London, South London, would all want the second Collegiate. The choosing of a site would make it one of the hardest propositions the board ever faced. Then the initial cost of the proposition is believed to be such that it would be prohibitive in the eyes of the ratepayers.

SOUTH AFRICAN VETERAN IS VICTIM OF CANCER

Quartermaster-Sergt. A.W. Black Had Been Instructor in Musketry.

Quartermaster-Sergeant A. W. Black, prominent in military circles of this city, and of the instructional staff of the Canadian School of Musketry, died at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hospital. He had been under the knife for cancer in that institution for many months. He was about 40 years of age.

Sergeant Black resided at 855 Wellington street. His wife, the daughter of ex-Sergeant A. W. Nannan, formerly, Sergeant Black was a color-sergeant in the Scots Guards, in the old land, and fought in the South African War.

BRITISH MILITANTS BUSY WITH BOMBS

Much Damage Done at Various Points in the British Isles.

[Canadian Press.]

London, Nov. 11.—Militant suffragette arson squads and bomb troops were at work in several parts of the British Isles during last night and succeeded in doing a considerable amount of damage.

A cactus house at Alexandra Park, Manchester, containing a collection valued at \$50,000, was badly wrecked by a bomb; Begbrook, a fine mansion near Bristol, was gutted by fire, and the house of the Bowdler family, in the Club at Catford, in the southeast of London, was also burned down.

At the scene of all the outrages quantities of suffrage literature and militant caps were found, but no clue to the criminals was obtained.

MR. BRIGLIA FIRST OF LONDON HARPERS

Brother Was Recently Killed in Automobile Accident in California.

Antonio Briglia, a member of the first company of London harpers, died Monday night at the family residence, 133 Queen's avenue. He had been a resident of this city for more than 26 years. Mr. Briglia was born in Italy, and was 60 years of age.

Eight years ago he removed to Denver, Colorado, where he resided until recently, when he returned to this city. Sag circumstances followed his homecoming. He had been in the city when a telegram was received stating that his brother Frank had been run over by an automobile at Oakland and instantly killed. Having just returned from that vicinity, the distance was too great to return, and he was unable to attend the funeral of the brother, who had been well on his departure.

He is survived by his wife, Annie; four daughters, Mrs. Camillo Petrone and Mrs. Charles Deluce, of Denver, Colorado; Miss Minnie and Miss Ella, at home; also by three sons, Guy, Pay and Frank.

The funeral will be held Thursday morning at 8:30 o'clock to St. Peter's Cathedral. Requiem high mass will be sung at 9 o'clock. Interment will be made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

MAGGREGOR CASE IN THE HIGH COURT TODAY

Was Down For Monday, But the Attorneys Were Delayed by Storm.

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 11.—Through the courtesy of members of the supreme court yesterday, Dr. Robert E. MacGregor will have his case brought before the high court today.

Just before the case was reached Monday it was discovered that the attorneys for MacGregor, who are seeking a new trial, were not in the court room and further inquiry brought out that a snowstorm had tied them up at Port Huron, making it impossible to arrive here in time to argue the case.

It is seldom that a case is ever given a lower place on the calendar once it is on the list, but when Attorney Snow, of Saginaw, representing the prosecution, explained the situation, the court placed the case further down the call.

FATALLY STRICKEN ON STREETS OF SARNIA

Wm. Holgate Overcome With Heart Failure on Way to Work.

Sarnia, Nov. 10.—William Holgate died suddenly from heart failure this morning after attempting to go to his work at the Imperial oil refinery. He left his home feeling in good health, but after walking a couple of blocks he felt ill and retraced his steps. Before medical attention could be called he passed away. His heart had been troubling him for some time past, and it is thought that the exertion of making his way through the deep snow this morning caused his sudden death.

Gale Hit Barns.
Sarnia, Nov. 10.—Trees were uprooted, telephone poles blown down, and wires were torn from moorings, and parts of buildings blown away in the severe blizzard that struck Sarnia on Sunday.

The river rose so high that the boiler-room of the Cleveland-Sarnia sawmill was flooded, and inestimable damage done. The mill was not in operation today. A large pile of lumber on a wharf at Point Edward, belonging to the Spanish River Lumber Company, was washed out into the river and taken away.

Street cars were completely tied up, and all trains were either held or running well behind schedule. The brick wall of a hotel stable was blown down, and the main who has swindled different Ontario banks to the extent of \$15,000, and who obtained money in Guelph, Stratford, Owen Sound, London, Chatham, Lindsay, Penelton Falls, and other towns by the use of fraudulent checks which were signed with the name, James Ray.

Detective Cronin leaves for Montreal this evening and will bring him to Toronto.

Although the above dispatch mentions London as one of the places where "Ray" operated, the statement is not true. "Ray" gave London a wide berth, according to bank managers and the police.
