MAJOR-GENERAL AMONG THE KILLED

Hamilton Was Military Secretary to Kitchener in South Africa—Fought at Mons.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—9:05 a.m.—A casualty list of the British expeditionary force in France, dated October 14, reports the death of Major-Gen. Hubert I. W. Hamilton and ten other officers, and the wounding of 25 officers.
Major-Gen. Hubert I. W. Hamilton commanded the third division of the British field troops, and was mentioned in the official dispatches of Field Marshal Sir John French to Earl Kitchener early in September, reporting the desperate fighting in the vicinity of Mons. He was born in 1861. He served in the Egyptian and South African campaigns, and in 1900-02 was military secretary to Lord Kitchener, who at the time was commander-in-chief of the British forces in South Africa. He was also military secretary to Lord Kitchener, when the latter was commander-in-chief in India.

BELGIAN SOLDIERS WEEP.
FOLKESTONE, via London, Oct. 18.—One of the most pathetic incidents of yesterday was the arrival here of the body of Major-Gen. Hubert I. W. Hamilton, which was conveyed from the quays in a hearse. Two hundred recruits of Kitchener's South African corps, outside the harbor station, and stood at attention while the hearse passed. The refugees uncovered their heads, and the emotional Belgian soldiers wept.

KILLED BY RADICAL CAR.
TORONTO, Oct. 18.—Thomas Gilmore, aged 40, a resident of Dixie, was run over and instantly killed by a west-bound radial car at the Long Branch Rifle Ranges at 10:40 o'clock on Saturday night.

RAIN CAUSES \$15,000 LOSS AT LEXINGTON

LEXINGTON, Oct. 17.—The grand circuit trotting meeting at the track of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association was declared off on account of rain, thus leaving five days of racing uncompleted, and \$15,000 in stake money unaccounted for.
About \$8,000 in entrance fees was refunded, and the management of the association announced that the loss on account of the rains would exceed \$15,000. It was decided that the stake money in the championship steeple chase, a guaranteed event, would be divided among the horses eligible to start, and the race will not take place.

TREACHERY HINTED AT IN QUESTIONS

British Parliament Has Many Ominous Queries To Face and Answer.
SIGNALLING TO ENEMY

Insinuation That Some of the British Royalty Are Serving With Enemy.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Notice has been given that the following questions, among others, will be addressed to the ministers on the reassembling of Parliament:

1. Whether the large number of military and naval officers employed in the press censor's department cannot be replaced by trained journalists, thus enabling the officers to place their experience at the disposal of recruits.
2. How many months have elapsed since the committee on imperial defence held a meeting, and whether, in view of the rumors of a possible invasion, a meeting is planned?
3. What authority had the Secretary of the Board of Trade for stating that Zeppelin dirigible balloons would attack London at the end of October, and whether he is aware that his statement caused an increase in insurance rates, adding greatly to the expenses of businessmen?

Signals to Enemy?

Whether the Secretary for Scotland is aware that Methil harbor (Scotland), on the Firth of Forth, is brilliantly lighted during the night, and that the local belief is that signalling takes place to the enemy?

ALLIES' POSITION IS ADVANTAGEOUS

An Uninterrupted Advance in Parts of Northern France Expected—Flanders Battle Hopeful.

Paris, Oct. 18.—8:45 a.m.—An uninterrupted offensive movement by the allies at certain points in Northern France was predicted here today as the battle was resumed. The retaking of Arras, on the River Lys, on the Belgian frontier and the occupation, ten days west of Lille, of the right line leading towards Douai via Ghent and Fromelles were considered as constituting an excellent advance guard position by reason of its numerous places of support. This, with the progress of several other sections, notably Arras, gave the allies hope of a continuance of their advance.

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CHURCHILL SENDS REPLY TO CRITICS

In Congratulations to Naval Brigades, Explains Cause of Antwerp Defence Mistake.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—3 p.m.—Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, who has been severely criticized in some quarters for dispatching naval brigades to Antwerp to assist in the defence of that fortress, has sent them a congratulatory message on their return, which has been made public by the admiralty. The first admiralty lord justifies the action taken.

The loss of a portion of the first brigade through a mistake in no way reflects upon the quality or character of the division. The brigades of Royal Marines throughout the operations sustained fully, by their firmness, discipline and courage, the traditions of the corps.
"It is not necessary to say more than this."
The naval division was sent to Antwerp not as an isolated incident, but as part of a large operation for the relief of the city. Other and more powerful considerations prevented this from being carried through. The defence of the inner lines of Antwerp could have been maintained for some days, and the naval division only withdrew when ordered to do so, in obedience to the general strategic situation and not on account of any attack or pressure of the enemy.

British Losses Are Over 13,000 For Four Weeks

LONDON, Oct. 18.—5:50 p.m.—An official report by General French, commanding the expeditionary force, gives the total of British killed, wounded and missing from September 12, to October 8, as 561 officers and 12,950 men.
The war office issued tonight an order casualty list received from headquarters under date of September 18, at gives fifty non-commissioned officers and men as having been killed, 149 men wounded and 555 men missing. Those of the killed belonged entirely to the Royal Scots, the Royal Irish and the East Surrey Regiments. The East Surreys, the King's Scottish Borderers and the Somerset Light Infantry figure largely in the missing list.
Of commissioned officers the list gives four killed and five wounded.

HOLLAND BOAT STRIKES MINE IN NORTH SEA

ROTTERDAM, Oct. 18.—The Holland-American Line steamship Noordam arrived here safely today after having struck a mine in the North Sea. It was said that no one on board was injured.
LONDON, Oct. 18.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Maastricht, Holland, says that the Holland-American Line steamship Noordam, which struck a mine in the English Channel yesterday, arrived safely at Rotterdam early today. The vessel's stern and rudder was slightly damaged, but there were no personal casualties.

VENICE, via Paris, Oct. 18.—The Austrian and Hungarian Governments have decided to summon to the colors all men between the ages of 21 and 36 liable to service in the landwehr, who hitherto have not served owing to physical disability or other causes.
These men will be re-examined and if found fit, will, in case of necessity, be called as substitute troops and sent to the front.
