2,000 COLLECTING AGENTS GO OUT ON STRIKE

Prudential Insurance Employees Claim Company Will Not Confer With Them.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Two thousand and collecting agents of the Prudential Life Insurance Company went on strike today. The walkout followed a spirited mass meeting here, at which it was said the strike would tie up the company's collecting business in the east as Chicago unless the men's terms were met. Chief among the grievances named was the refusal of the company to confer with the men.

Officials of the International Insurance Agents' Union, which is only two weeks old, declare that the failure of the Prudential Company to reinstate fifty agents here and about half that number in Philadelphia, who were discharged for organizing the union, would very likely result in the calling out of collecting agents in cities in the east and middle west.

AUSTRALIANS HAVE TAKEN 151 PRISONERS SO FAR

LONDON, July 24.—11:30 p.m.—The British official statement from headquarters in France, issued tonight, reads:

"The fighting has continued in the village of Posieres, where the number of prisoners taken by the Australian troops has reached a total of six officers and 145 other ranks."

"In other parts of the battle front there has been considerable artillery activity on both sides."

"Between the Ancre and the sea nothing of importance has occurred."

This afternoon's statement said:

"Apart from continuous heavy shelling by both sides during the night comparative calm followed the severe fighting of yesterday."

"Yesterday, between Highwood and Guillemont, repeated counter-attacks by the enemy gained for him no advantage, and very heavy casualties were inflicted by our artillery and machine gun fire."

"We gained some ground near Highwood and in the direction of Guillemont. In the neighborhood of Posieres we secured important advantages in spite of stubborn defence of the enemy, and a large portion of the village is now in our hands. Here we have captured two guns and 60 more prisoners."

COMMUNION SERVICE AND THEN BANQUET ON DEUTSCHLAND

German Submarine Is Partially Submerged at Her Slip—Anxiety Regarding Bremen May Delay Departure.

BALTIMORE, Md., July 24.—A communion service was held tonight aboard the interned North German Lloyd steamer Neckar, lying alongside the submarine Deutschland, for the captain and crew of the submarine. A German immigrant missionary conducted the service. In his prayer, he asked that the vessel and her crew may have a safe voyage home.

The service was followed by a banquet. It was learned that the Deutschland was partially submerged at her slip this evening. The water is not deep enough for full submergence.

WORRIED ABOUT BREMEN. NORFOLK, Va., July 24.—Appearance of a strange allied warship off Cape Henry today led to rumors that a British and French fleet of considerable size was in the vicinity of the southern drill grounds, awaiting the departure of the German submarine merchantman Deutschland or the arrival of her sister ship, the Bremen.

Failure of the Bremen to appear caused considerable disappointment in German circles here today. The feeling prevailed that the departure of the Deutschland from Baltimore might be delayed indefinitely, pending receipt of news regarding the Bremen. If she has fallen into a trap, it is pointed out, it would be unwise for the Deutschland to put out to sea unadvised.

As the report of the presence of a considerable allied force outside the capes gained ground, the belief that the Bremen might have been captured or destroyed was more widely accepted. There was no tangible evidence, however, to support it.

IRISH SITUATION WORSE NOW THAN IN MANY YEARS

London Papers Deplore Collapse of Negotiations. SEE ONLY TROUBLE AHEAD

LONDON, July 25.—2:05 a.m.—All the morning papers commented editorially, earnestly and gravely, on the collapse of the Irish negotiations. The Daily Telegraph says:

"The abandonment of the recent hopes of a settlement means trouble—trouble in Ireland and trouble in the House of Commons. We have the old millstone tied once more around our necks in a heavier and more dangerous shape than ever, and we shall be fortunate if it does not hamper our progress at every step through the deep waters to be traversed."

The Daily News says: "The collapse of the negotiations leaves the Irish problem not merely unsettled, but worse than it has been at any time since the eighties."

Deplorable Tragedy. The Express says: "The whole business is a deplorable tragedy. There has been a plethora of delay and misunderstanding, until now we are faced with the breakdown of a political truce which has existed since the beginning of the war, and the leaders of the nation, who should be devoting all their minds to defeating the enemy, are again to be distracted by an internal feud and dissension."

The Graphic says: "Once more the attempt to establish home rule has failed, because, like previous home rule schemes, it neither satisfies Irish sentiment nor secures justice for Great Britain."

INFANTILE PARALYSIS APPEARS NEAR TORONTO

Twelve Cases in Province—Epidemic Not Feared.

TORONTO, July 24.—Two cases of infantile paralysis have been discovered at Tottenham, a suburb of this city. These are the first reported about Toronto. Cases have been found at North Tilbury, Newmarket, Windsor and Ford City, some twelve in all in this province. Dr. McCullough of the provincial board of health says he does not fear an epidemic of the disease such as is occurring in New York.

THOUSANDS FLEE IN HUNGARY WHEN COSSACKS APPEAR

Russians Penetrate 30 Miles Into Country.

REFUGEES BLOCK ROADS

Are Without Food and Hammer Military Transport on Highway.

LONDON, July 25.—3:15 a.m.—A dispatch to the Morning Post from Budapest, dated July 15, says:

"Some Cossack detachments succeeded in crossing into Hungary yesterday, creating a panic throughout the frontier towns and villages, and causing thousands of refugees to swarm down on the plains. The Russians penetrated about 30 miles and then rapidly withdrew, fighting continuously with detachments of gendarmes."

"Correspondents explain the panic of the populace by saying that a dozen Cossacks are sufficient to frighten and put to flight a hundred thousand women and children."

"These refugees," continues the correspondent, "have greatly embarrassed the local authorities, who cannot supply them with accommodations. Moreover they block the road, hampering military transport and holding up supplies. The refugees are entirely without food. The cattle which they drove with them also have had nothing to eat, owing to the sparse vegetation in the mountains."

"Journalists who have seen the exodus in the Bukovina region say that only the Serbian flight into Montenegro and Albania can be compared to it. Everywhere are to be seen bands of persons who died from exhaustion, and often beside them the carcasses of horses."

FRENCH MAKE GAIN SOUTH OF SOMME AND ABOUT VERDUN

Redoubt Captured West of Thiaumont Work.

PARIS, July 24.—The official communication issued by the war office tonight, reads:

"South of the Somme a minor operation enabled us to capture this morning an enemy battery south of the village of Estrees. Since July 20 we have taken on the Somme front more than sixty German machine guns."

"On the right bank of the Meuse, after a spirited engagement, our infantry occupied a redoubt immediately west of the Thiaumont work, taking five machine guns and about forty prisoners."

"Calm prevailed on the rest of the front. One of our pilots, Sub-Lieut. De Lorme, already cited six times in army orders, is again cited because of a series of bombardments carried out by him on stations held by the enemy."

NEW RUSS BATTLESHIP ON THE BLACK SEA

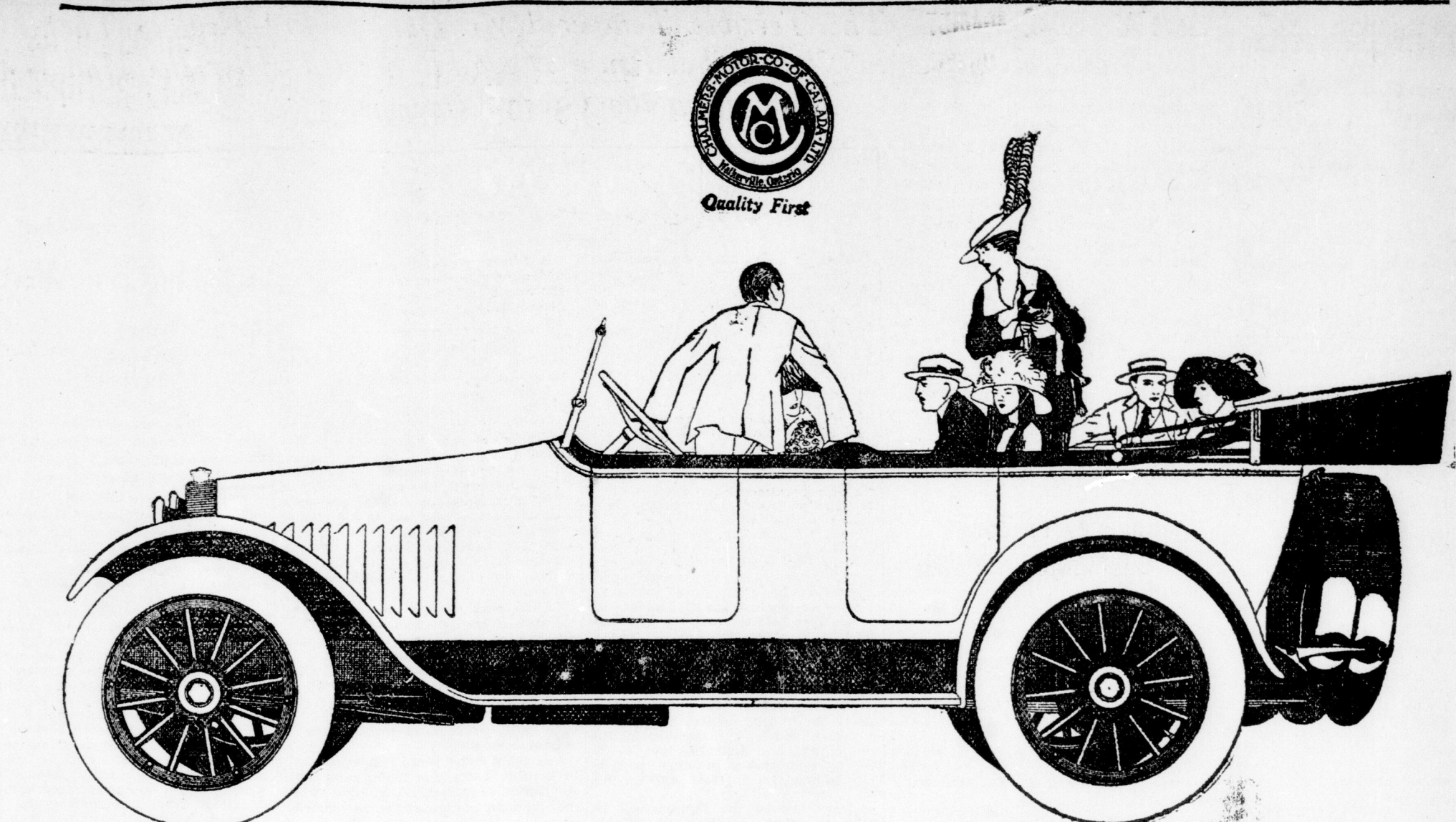
Turks Say German Cruiser Breslau Managed to Escape From It.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 24.—Via London.—An official communication today said:

"The German cruiser Breslau (formerly the Russian cruiser Midulla) encountered south of Sebastopol on Saturday strong hostile naval forces, including a new Russian man-of-war of the Imperatritsa Maria type (the Imperatritsa Maria is a battleship of 22,500 tons), and four new destroyers, which tried to cut her off. After an engagement of four hours the Midulla broke through their envelopment and returned undamaged."

SHERBROOKE, July 24.—The second death as a result of an automobile accident near here Saturday afternoon occurred today when Ronald St. Denis died from his injuries. David Tailleux died Sunday morning. Louis Verellias is in the hospital in a serious condition.

BULLET IN HIS HEART, CALLS MEN TO CHARGE

PETROGRAD, July 24.—The war office today issued the following:

"The following details have been received regarding the exploit of Col. Tatarnoff, who was mentioned in the communication of July 21. Wounded in the heart by a shrapnel bullet the colonel said, 'I am killed' but, by a supreme effort, he got up and dashed forward, crying 'Charge!' He died with that word on his lips."

In the official statement of July 21 it was declared that Col. Tatarnoff died in the latter part of June, south-west of Dubno, while crossing a river at the head of his regiment "under a murderous fire and putting the enemy to disorderly flight."

NORWEGIAN STEAMER DAMAGED. ST. JOHNS, Nfld., July 24.—The Norwegian steamer Athos, from Bathurst, N.B., for St. Nazaire, France, with lumber, put into Trepassay today with her forepeak filled with water. She struck near Cape Race yesterday, but later floated and reached port without assistance.

Kaiser Goes Back to the East Front

BERLIN, July 24, via London.—6 p.m.—Emperor William, 66, was officially announced today, has moved from the western to the eastern theatre of the war, accompanied by the chief of the general staff of the army in the field.

CHARGED WITH MURDER

Private at Camp Borden Arrested for U. S. Authorities.

CAMP BORDEN, July 24.—Pte. Rousseau, alias Demarco, 176th Battalion, was arrested here today at the request of the chief of police of Youngstown, N. Y., who charges him with murder. Rousseau was lodged in Barrle jail tonight by members of the military police to await the arrival of the American officers. He denies the charge.

WILL OF DUNCAN COULSON ADMITTED TO PROBATE

Estate Is Valued at \$693,056, Chiefly Stocks and Bonds.

TORONTO, July 24.—Probate has just been granted the will of Duncan Coulson, former president of the Bank of Toronto, who died last February. The estate is valued at \$693,056, of which \$596,283 is in stocks and bonds, and the largest holding is in International Nickel, in which the testator held 3,711 shares, valued at \$198,078.

The deceased's widow gets the use of the income of the estate during her lifetime, and after her death, with the exception of two moderate legacies to other relatives, the residue of the estate is to be divided among his sons.

DEUTSCHLAND'S WIRELESS SEALED

BALTIMORE, July 24.—The Deutschland's wireless equipment was sealed today by a Government radio inspector. When Capt. Koenig entered his arrival at the custom house on the 10th inst., he was informed by custom officials that if he stayed in port more than two weeks his wireless would be sealed. The two weeks' limit expired today.

WILL NEED 55,000 MEN TO HARVEST CROPS

Factories May Be Asked to Release Men to Fill the Shortage.

WINNIPEG, July 24.—At a conference of representatives of the immigration department in the west and officials of the railways held here this morning it was announced that if the supply of harvest hands fell short of the number required an appeal would be made to the large factories in the east to release men to fill the shortage of labor.

The men required in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta is estimated at 15,000, 20,000 and 10,000 respectively.

The rates and time limits on tickets from the east will probably be the same as last year. Excursions from eastern points will begin about August 15.

GERMAN EDITOR DEAD

BERLIN, July 24, via London.—5:53 p.m.—Dr. Ernst G. Oertel, editor-in-chief of the Deutsche Tages Zeitung, is dead. For many years he was one of the most prominent figures of the Agrarian movement. He was at Leipzig in 1856.

WILL OPEN NAVIGATION ON HUDSON BAY SOON

Government Has Forwarded Construction Supplies for Dozen Lighthouses.

OTTAWA, July 24.—The department of marine is preparing for immediate opening of navigation of Hudson Bay and Straits. Construction supplies are on the way for a dozen lighthouses, ten in the straits and two at Port Nelson.
