FOR DISPELLING **CLOUDS OF WAR**

Lloyd George Declares Arms Delegate Treated Big Problems in Big Way.

PRAISES U. S. PRESIDENT FOR ARRANGING PARLEY

British Statesmen' of All Parties Attend Luncheon in London.

LONDON, Feb. 16 .- Arthur J. Balfour was officially welcomed home to-day from the Washington conference at a luncheon by the government and coalition members of both houses of

Parliament Prime Minister Lloyd George, presiding at the luncheon, paid a strik-ing tribute to Mr. Balfour, saying he had taken part in "one of the most notable contributions statesmanship has ever made for the sum of human ceace and human happiness."

About 400 persons were present at the luncheon, including Austen Chamberlain, government leader in the House of Commons; Lord Chancellor Birkenhead, Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary; Lord Lee of Fareham, who was also a member of the British delegation at Washington; the Duke of Devonshire and Lord Derby. Viscountess Astor was the only woman present. The company rose and gave Mr. Balfour a rous-ing reception as he entered with the minister. During the course of his remarks Mr. Lloyd George said: "I am delighted to thank the man who above all others helped to clear the skies. He treated great problems in a great way. He didn't haggle. He believed in the permanence of the conference. Because it reduced the burdens of anxiety, he has more than ever the trust and affections of the multitudes of his fellow countrymen.

"The volcanic shores of the Pacific were littered with explosive materials not well covered," he continued, "and at any moment there was danger that things might happen that would once more precipitate the world into the carnage and horrors of a great war.'

At the beginning of his address Mr. Lloyd George said Mr. Balfour's friends wished to express admira tion "for the way he behaved while

away from home. We are prouder of him than ever, he continued. "The distinction and dexterity with which he handled the affairs of this county at Washington filled our hearts with real pride." Have Missed Vocation.

The premier read a message of apreciation of Mr. Balfour's invaluable assistance and sympathetic co-operaion from President Harding. Mr. Lloyd George said that "stateswho haggle have missed their vocation; they should be horse deal-

Alluding to the situation in the Far East prior to the Washington conference, Mr. Lloyd George con-

"I am not exaggerating the dangers. There were whispered murmurs in the wind about preparations and projects, about what might happen here and would certainly happen Everywhere you had those there. rumors and suspicions. The President of the United States rendered a service to humanity by taking up the situation in time and by dealing with it. As a result of that great conference which he gathered together, misunderstandings have been removed and suspicions not merely allayed, but completely cleared away. The western sky is clear, and I used to be taught as a boy that when the skies lifted in the west a bright day would follow. I believe the same thing will happen here again. Although the east is thick and dark with clouds, the west is clear, and the

Pleased All Parties.

Declaring that Mr. Balfour de-clined petty measures, Mr. Lloyd George declared, "the result is an achievement that pleased all parties. The best bargain is the only one that will hold. A bargain in which one party goes away displeased, especially in international affairs, is one somebody will seek an opportunity of getting out of. It is because everyone is pleased that I believe in the permanence of this bargain. I believe it is one of the most conspicuous services rendered to the British Empire and to humanity." The premier said the old idea was

that the best diplomat was he who snatched the greatest apparent and obvious advantage either to national advantage or national ambition, or some other motive, respectable or the reverse. He pointed out that none of those things could be said of the Washington conference, and that no such spirit animated the powers there assembled. They were never slaves to that preposterous fallacy that there was a fixed amount of damage to be got by somebody, and if one nation got it another nation lost it.

He said he believed the foundations had been laid upon which great questions might be settled. "I believe, also," he continued, "the question of naval armaments was settled. although everybody may not have got all he would desire. The land problems of the Far East, the naval problems of the Pacific, and less obvious but not less really, the question of naval disarmament or naval diminution of arms, in Europe, I believe have been settled.'
