BONOMI ASKS FOR EXPLICIT VERDICT

Italian Ex-Premier Goes to Chamber of Deputies For Clear Explanation.

Rome, Feb. 17.—In the chamber of deputies yesterday Premier Bonomi in a speech on the ministerial situation declared he presented himself before the chamber to request a clear and explicit verdict on the question of confidence.

Reviewing the internal policy of the government, Signor Bonomi claimed that public order had been greatly improved and that the budget deficit had been reduced from eleven billion lire last year to five billion lire for the current year.

LAUDS BALFOUR FOR DISPELLING CLOUDS OF WAR

Lloyd George Declares Arms Delegate Treated Big Problems in Big Way.

PRaises U. S. President FOR ARRANGING PARLEY

British Statesmen of All Parties Attend Luncheon in London.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Arthur J. Balfour was officially welcomed home today from the Washington conference at a luncheon by the government and coalition members of both houses of Parliament.

Prime Minister Lloyd George, presiding at the luncheon, paid a striking tribute to Mr. Balfour, saying he had taken part in "one of the most notable contributions statesmanship has ever made for the sum of human peace and human happiness."

About 400 persons were present at the luncheon, including Austen Chamberlain, government leader in the House of Commons; Lord Chancellor, Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary; Lord Lee of Fareham, who was also a member of the British delegation at Washington; the Duke of Devonshire and Lord Derby. Viscountess Astor was the only woman present.

The premier's reference to the Genoa economic conference brought forth stormy interruptions. The Socialists and communists hurled invective at the cabinet. The word "buffoon" was frequently heard. The Catholics, however, applauded Signor Bonomi. Thereupon the members of the extreme left rose against the Catholics shouting, "Shame upon you to applaud."

The pandemonium lasted five minutes. Signor Bonomi was given an ovation when he spoke in approval of the Washington conference.

Toward the close of his speech, Signor Bonomi alluded to the death of Pope Benedict. He said the events connected with the death of the pontiff once again had shown that the spiritual authority of the church could remain untrammelled within a free state.

Have Missed Vocation. The premier read a message of appreciation of Mr. Balfour's invaluable assistance and sympathetic co-operation from President Harding.

Mr. Lloyd George said that "statesmen who haggle have missed their vocation; they should be horse dealers."

Alluding to the situation in the Far East prior to the Washington conference, Mr. Lloyd George continued: "I am not exaggerating the dangers. There were whispered murmurs in the wind about preparations and projects, about what might happen here and would certainly happen there. Everywhere you had those rumors and suspicions. The President of the United States rendered a service to humanity by taking up the situation in time and by dealing with it. As a result of that great conference which he gathered together, misunderstandings have been removed and suspicions not merely allayed, but completely cleared away. The western sky is clear, and I used to be taught as a boy that when the skies lifted in the west a bright day would follow. I believe the same thing will happen here again. Although the east is thick and dark with clouds, the west is clear, and the east will follow."

"I am delighted," he continued, "to thank the man who above all others helped to clear those skies. It was a noble achievement and noble was the part Mr. Balfour took in it."

Pleased All Parties. Declaring that Mr. Balfour declined petty measures, Mr. Lloyd George declared, "the result is an achievement that pleased all parties. The best bargain is the only one that will hold. A bargain in which one party goes away displeased, especially in international affairs, is one somebody will seek an opportunity of getting out of. It is because everyone is pleased that I believe in the permanence of this bargain. I believe it is one of the most conspicuous services rendered to the British Empire and to humanity."

The premier said the old idea was that the best diplomat was he who snatched the greatest apparent and obvious advantage either to national advantage or national ambition, or some other motive, respectable or the reverse. He pointed out that none of those things could be said of the Washington conference, and that no such spirit animated the powers there assembled. They were never slaves to that preposterous fallacy that there was a fixed amount of damage to be got by somebody, and if one nation got it, another nation lost it.

He said he believed the foundations had been laid upon which great questions might be settled. "I believe, also," he continued, "the question of naval armaments was settled, although everybody may not have got all he would desire. The land problems of the Far East, the naval problems of the Pacific, and less obvious but no less really, the question of naval disarmament or naval diminution of arms, in Europe, I believe have been settled."

ANXIETY CAUSED BY MACNEIL'S CONDITION

Winnipeg, Feb. 17.—The condition of Dan MacNeil, president of the Dominion Football Association, was last night causing anxiety. He is suffering from double pneumonia and pleurisy. While curling with Cam Chisholm's rink in the bonspiel last week he slipped and injured his back and later contracted the illness from which he is now suffering.

SLEMIN CHARGES PERJURY IN CASE

ever having accepted any money to influence the course of justice."

Replying to Mr. McEwen, Commissioner Gregory observed that the direct charges made against Stander would not involve any complicated defence.

"I regret that Mr. Stander does not propose to come here and appear in his own behalf, for I wish to give him every opportunity to put in his defence on every charge," the commissioner remarked. He added: "I don't think the reasons you have given, Mr. McEwen, are sufficient to justify Mr. Stander's decision."

John H. Spence, referring to the charge against Fred McArthur, who was under the influence of liquor while the police raid took place at

his house, said he had spoken to the magistrate about McArthur's case, and there had been an adjournment of the case.

There had been another charge laid against McArthur by High County Constable Fred Kerr. This was for an alleged breach of the Ontario Temperance act, the witness believed. He also referred to a charge of perjury, laid against McArthur by Chief Slemin.

Because of McArthur's conviction and fine of \$200 for the liquor offence, thus making his home an illegal place for liquor, Mr. Spence said that he remembered advising McArthur to get rid of it.

New Tacks Were Clue.

Details of the search at Alfred Riddolls' house, 13 Mary street, were related by Mr. Spence, who told of the initial discovery that new tacks had been laid in the office on the floor in an upstairs room. Subsequently, some liquor was found, which witness identified as part of that which had been stolen from his

house on Sept. 18. More liquor was later discovered in a downstairs room.

Mr. Spence told of seeing Mr. Riddolls, sen., at his house. The witness said: "This is a nice state of affairs for you to be in." Mr. Riddolls professed ignorance, saying: "I heard that your place was robbed, but I was away over the week-end."

Subsequently, Mr. Spence was asked by Mr. Hughes why he had allowed McArthur his liberty on bail after he had pleaded guilty to a charge. Mr. Spence said he did not consider this improper, referring Mr. Hughes to a similar case, where William Vandusen was involved.

Called Magistrate.

The perjury charge against McArthur was laid when the witness was out of town. On his return he called up Magistrate Livingston, saying that he would go bail for McArthur. Magistrate Livingston asked for a bond of \$500 and this was promised. The bail bond, however, was taken out by

Mr. Lyle, senior customs and excise clerk.

Subsequently, Mr. Spence went to Toronto and took the matter up with Gen. Elliott of the attorney-general's department, and the head of the provincial police, before whom he laid the complete details of the McArthur perjury charge.

Going into details on the perjury charge against McArthur, Mr. Spence said he believed that McArthur had been "framed" by the police. It was a case of "anything to get the man as long as they got him. These are the complete details of the McArthur perjury charge."

REGISTERS 22 BELOW ZERO IN QUEBEC CITY

Toronto, Feb. 17.—Quebec city took the medals from White River, Ontario, today as the coldest spot heard from in Canada. The official mercury in the ancient capital hit 22 below during the day and was still

at 20 below at 8 o'clock. White River was but 12 below at 8 o'clock although it touched 40 below during the night. This morning's weather in Canada all the way from Calgary to St. John, N.B., was registered as very cold. Winnipeg only reporting above zero, at the "zero hour" of 8 a.m. Balmier weather is expected tomorrow or Sunday.

CLAIMS SERVANTS SKILLED WORKERS.

London, England, Feb. 17.—Domestic service is a skilled job and the opposite of a degrading occupation, declared Lady Astor, M.P., presiding at a conference of unemployment among women.
