ANNOUNCES £48,329,000 SURPLUS OVER 1922

London, April 29.—Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchaquer, in introducing the budget in the House of Commons today, announced that the Labor government "is unable to indorse the

NOT TO ABOLISH PRESENT PREFERENCES.

It was not proposed, he added, to ask parliament to abolish the preferences now in force, but the Labor government reserved full liberty "to propose, whenever it deemed expedient, to reduce or abolish all kinds of preferences now granted."

The chancellor recommended that the McKenna duties be applished. These duties expire May 1, the chancellor explained. but there was a period of three months additional for protection before the expiration actually became effective, therefore they would expire August 1.
