J. L. PATON COMES TO CANADIAN CLUB

Other Interesting Speakers Include Dr. Caroline Brown on Monday Next.

Two distinguished speakers will address members of the Women's Canadian club next week in the persons of Dr. Caroline Brown, Toronto educationist, and John Lewis Paton, retiring high master of Manchester grammar school.

The first speaker is promised for Monday afternoon, Dr. Brown is a member of the Toronto school board and was sent as a delegate from that body to a triennial empirical educational conference held in London, England, last July. Her address will be an account of that conference.

John Lewis Paton will speak before a combined meeting called by the Western Ontario university extension department, the men's and women's Canadian clubs and the women teachers' guild. His lecture, which will be on "The School and International Relations," will be given in the Central collegiate auditorium on Tuesday night, Nov. 25.

Mr. Paton, who is retiring high master of the Manchester grammar school, has come to Canada on the invitation of the national council of education, and is spending a year in this country on work of a general educational nature. His career in the educational world of England has been unique, and among many great school masters his work has been outstanding.

On Dec. 3 the club will entertain the members of the writing profession of London at a reception, where the chief guest will be Madge Macbeth of Ottawa, who will speak on "Untraveled Waterways and Byways of Canada."

Another interesting speaker comes on Dec. 10, when Captain State of England will address a joint meeting of the men's and women's clubs on "Our Mother Country," with lantern illustrations. Captain State, who has been a public agent in connection with one of the railroads, has travelled up and down Canada as well as England. His address will deal with different sections of England and the Wembley exhibition.

PAUL DE MARKY WILL BE HEARD IN RECITAL

Appears Tonight in Central Collegiate Auditorium in Brilliant Program.

Music-lovers of London will again have the pleasure of hearing Paul De Marky in piano recital in the Central collegiate auditorium tonight at 8:15 o'clock.

Mr. De Marky's brilliant recital of last May is still fresh in the memory of those who heard him. Since then his reputation as a brilliant musician has greatly increased. Mr. De Marky is a native of Budapest and came to this country a year ago. He has made music his life work having studied with the best teachers in Europe. His brilliant technique is of the finished quality that is rarely found in a musician so young.

Tonight his program will include the following interesting numbers: Chopin, "Ballade G Minor," "Nocturne F Sharp Major," "Two Waltzes," "Mazurka C Sharp Minor," "Two Etudes," "Mozart's 'Etude,' "Caprice Espagnol," Schubert-Tausig, "Marche Militaire," Bach-Busoni, "Chaconne," Haydn, "Andante and Variations," Mendelssohn, "Caprice E Minor," Rachmaninoff, "Prelude G Minor," Heymann, "Patries at Play," and Debussy-Daphnys, waltz from the ballet, "Nala."

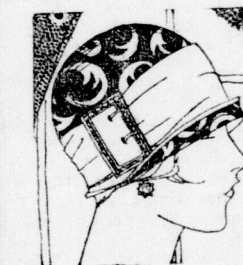

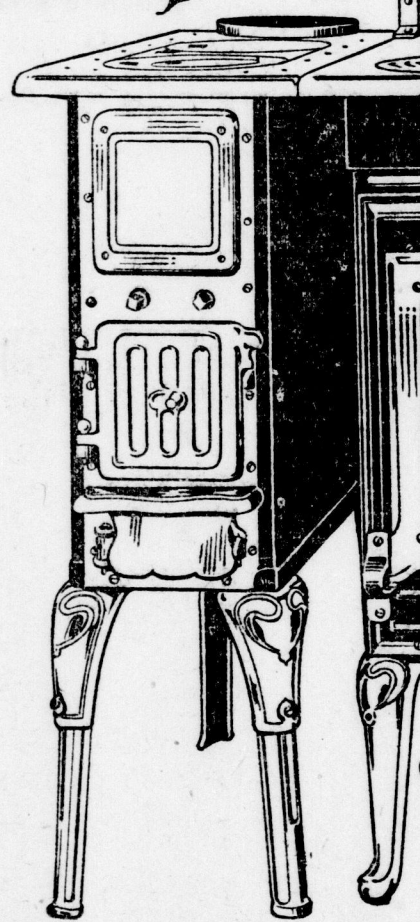

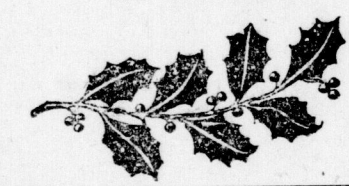
