SIX MINERS ENTRAPPED BY COLLIERY EXPLOSION

Special to The Advertiser.

London, Dec. 20.-When an explosion shook the Birchingwood colliery last night, 370 miners made their way to safety, according to reports from the coal region. Six miners still are entrapped, the despatches added, and it s feared they have scant chance of life. Four rescue parties worked through out the night, fighting fire which folowed the explosion.

The entombed men are reported alost a mile away from the opening of the shaft.
