SERIOUS FIRE AT UPSALQUITCH RAILWAY STATION BURNED
Mill and Lumber Yards of Reid, Smith & Mitton Totally Destroyed.
A report that Upsalquitch, a village about nine miles from here on the International branch of the C. N. Railway, was swept by fire last evening was contradicted this morning by parties who came through from St. Leonard. That locality was the scene of a serious fire however, in which the railway station, the mill, and the yards of Reid, Smith and Mitton and a number of other buildings were totally destroyed. The loss will undoubtedly run into many thousands of dollars, but an authentic estimate of the damage is not yet available. It is understood that two railway trucks at that point were in danger for some time but these were finally saved with the help of pumps rushed to the scene of the blaze. A report from Upsalquitch states that the Hunting Lodge in that vicinity were not in danger as they are located some little distance from the fire. A telegram from the Fraternal Red Cross Society at St. John was received by the local Red Cross organization this morning with reference to forwarding relief and supplies to the scene of the blaze but it is now thought that such action will not be necessary. A traveller arrived from the I. N. R. fire some this morning with his clothing badly burned but no signs of serious injury save to his hair and face.
