In every municipality in which small-pox exists such local arrangements as are provided for by chapter 191 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, shall be made by the Local Board of Health for the systematic and compulsory performance of vaccination, wherever the council of any locality shall omit to make such arrangements or may not be authorized by the said Act to make the same.
