If tobacco is not violently de-

tain conditions. After surgical opera-

tions, when the patient is unable to eat,

tobacco should be administered, but in

such cases the patient is not likely to wish

to smoke. In peritonitis, typhus, and

peripneumonia, tobacco is also likely to

be harmful. In organic diseases of the

heart mild tobacco may be allowed in

moderation to patients who have been

smokers from early life. In the early

stages of phthisis smoking is often use-

ful, owing to its undoubted bactericidal&lt;/
