A SPECIAL REPORT ON THE VALUE OF THE TOURIST TRAFFIC

Submitted by Dominion Atlantic Railway to the Conference of Valley Boards of Trade, Civic Officials and Newspaper Editors. Kentville, N. S., April 4th, 1916.

Canada's tourist traffic for 1913 took fourth place in her national sources of income.

1st, Field Crops . . . \$509,437,000
2nd, Forest Products . . . 161,093,000
3rd, Minerals . . . 102,000,000
4th, Tourist Traffic . . . 50,000,000
5th, Fisheries . . . 43,667,000

In analysing the local situation along the Dominion Atlantic, between Yarmouth and Halifax in 1915, we found that there were 271 hotels and boarding houses with accommodation for 6,198 guests at one time. Our tourist seasons (including the Spring and early Summer fishing) totals
