Marine News

Digby Courier: The tug Gypsum King arrived with the barge, Canada in tow. The barge which is at anchor off the Racquette, will tow into the spur on the arrival of the Bear River and will be the first to load gypsum at this port this season.

The tern schooner Cleste D. launched a few weeks ago by the Doucet Shipbuilding Company, from their shipyards at Meteghan River, was purchased last week by the Bridge-water Shipping Co. Her new owners have secured a charter for the schooner to load lumber at Portland, Me., for a southern port.

J. Octave D'Eon and others, of West Pubnico, are arranging to build a schooner in the Hankinson Shipping Co.'s yard at Belliveau's Cove which they expect to have completed and ready for the spring fisheries. The vessel will be of the same knock about type about 95 feet long, and is to be moderately equipped. Charles White will be the master builder.

The Yarmouth tug "Mary H. Cann" Capt. Peters has returned from Plympton, where she towed the schooner "E. P. Theriault" from the wharf at that place to an anchorage from which she would be able to sail as soon as weather conditions were favorable. The schooner is in charge of Capt. Dostie Duceppe of Cape St. Mary's, and is lumber laden bound to Bartlett's.

Capt. J. Burton, of North Sydney, was in Yarmouth Monday with a handsome model of a three masted schooner which he will build in F. K. Warren's yard at Grasses Coves, Digby Co. The vessel will measure 120 feet over all, 27 wide, 11 deep and was designed by James Harding of Shelburne. The model calls for exceptionally fine lines and the vessel when completed will be a handsome craft.

Owing to the embargo which the United States government has placed on the exporting of coal the charter of the Digby schooner Jean F. Anderson to carry coal from Norfolk to Kingston, Ja., has been cancelled. Her owners have, however, secured another good charter and the schooner has been ordered to proceed to Brunswick, Ga., where she will load lumber for Havana and after discharging at that port she will make two trips in the Gulf trade.

"They just could not help it," it rolled in on them by the thousands of pounds, trawled up from the sea. Many trawlers were taken by the Admiralty and used for patrol work and mine sweeping. SCHIP. MOTHERLAND LEAKING

The schooner Motherland, built at Meteghan for Annapolis Royal parties and launched in the spring of 1917, arrived at Lorenzo Marques, on October 24, from Malunga and reported that she had been ordered to proceed to Port Natal, but owing to continued bad weather she was unable to make that port. On October 18, when off Durban Point, she was struck by a heavy gale and driven back under bare masts 60 miles north of Delagoa Bay. The vessel is badly strained and the water in hold is now over the top of the ballast and the pump is choked. All sails need stitching. It is proposed to tow her to Port Natal.
