## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

 ontario.The past week has brought about no material change in the lumber situation in Ontario. Generally speaking, trade is about normal for this season of the year, with prices firm and a decidedly hopefui feeling in respect to the early spring demand. No confirmation has been recelv. ed of the repor: that certain Ottawa valley manulacturers have disposed of their 1901 production of British deals, but there is reason to believe that contracts will be closed in the near future. The weather closed in the nearfuture. The weather
conditions in the Georgian Bay district have been unfavorable for logging operations, being mild and rainy. As we go to press it is learned that there has been a fall of snoty which will greatly faciliate work in the woods. Additional reports are to hand telling of the limited quantity of logs to be taken out this winter, the scarcity of men and high wages being the scarcity of men and high wages being the principal reasons. Besides, funs up in the northerm pine districts of
the province probably $200,000,000$ feet of pine logs, which will likely be available for next season's sawing.
The expected advance in the price of lath has nol yet taken place, but jud,ing from the firm position of holders of this stock, higher prices seem to be assured.

QUEEEC=AND NEW BRUNSWICK.
IThat ihe past season has not been al. touether satisfactory to the lumbermen of the eastern provinces is shown by a comparison of the shipments of lumber from parison of the shipments of Jumber from
the port of Montreal to the United Kingdom. The figures show a decrease, as compared with the previous year, of nearly $60,000,000$ feet. Taking the exports of tour of the leading shippers, we find a decrease of nearly $50,000,000$ feet. This decrease, of course, may be accounted for in part by the fire in the Ottawa lumber district last spring. Statistics of the eastern ports are not to hand but we believe ern ports are not to hand, but we believe they also will sho:v a falling off in ship ments. At the present time business in lumber circles is quiet, and manutacturers are looking into the future with some eagerness. There has been a slight improvement in the United States trade, with a terdency towards higher prices. It is expected that an advance of ten cents wil be made in the price of cedar shingles, be made in the price of cedar shingles,
which are now selling, on Boston raie of which are now selling, on Boston rate of
freight, at $\$ 2.75$ to $\$ 2.90$ for exiras, freight, at $\$ 2.75$ to $\$ 2.90$ for exiras,

## great aritain.

The position of the Britush timber market at the present time contrasts very strongly with the course of the market twelve months ago, when imporiers were eager to place orders at current quolations. Now no contracts for spring shipments are being placed, and it is said that some of the agents have not been supplied with their shipper's stock shee s. There seems to be a fecling on behalf of the shippers that it is advisable to wait until after the new year, when some oi the surp'us stucks will be worked off. The
results of recent sales have not added strength to the market. The Timber Trades Journal, usually a reliable authority, remarks that "there is no escaping from the fact that there is ageneral sink ing of prices from the high level they lately occupied, and nobody can forsee when the tottom will be reached." Shippers arc being alvised 10 lower their prices on being advised to lond per standard, and deals about one pnund per stlings, but we on battens ten to fifteen shilings, but we are inclined to the opinion, so far as Canadian lumber is concerned, that when the knowledge of the decreased production becomes more generally known, the market will pick up agann.

UNITED SIATES.
The late tendency to cut prices of pine lumber is no longer reporied. The market has strengthened, and dealers and consumers alike appear convinced that the srock of pine lumber will be inadequate for the demands of the winter and spring. for the demands of therous but there Sales have not been numerons, bur there has been an active euquiry for spring delivery. At Buffalo it is feared that a serious shortage in box lumber and certain other grades will be experienced. Eastern spruce is firm, and higher prices are being asked. Hemlock is also selling in the Eastern States at good value. The most noticenble improvement, perhaps mos beu the hardwoods. The demand ene position is decidedly stronger, while the position of the consuming industries is such as to forecast a heavy movement of stock in the spring. The piano manufacturers are pur chasing considerable quantities of elm.
In the Chicago market low grade inch pine is very dull, as is also cull stock, but No 1 and No, boards are exceedingly No. and sore and bring prices. On the scarce and bring full prees. On the Pacifiz coast conditions have not changed There is a disposition to curtail the pro-
duction of red cedar shingles duing the winter.

## STOCKS AND RICES.

The London Electric Company, of Lon don, Ont., recently imported iwo carloads of red cedar electric light poles from Idahe, supplied by Firkins \& Company, of Minneapoilis.

The ship St. David sailed from Chemainus, B.C. last week for A:sstralia, with ainus, B.C., last week tor Aistralia, Whe sehooner Defender and the ship Great Admiral are loading at the same port.
O. W. Sanders, of Duluth, Minnesoia, has taken a contract from the Rat Portage I_umber Co., of Rat Portage, Cnt., for getting out about $30,000,000$ feet of logs on Sturgeon river. He will cut about 5,000,000 leet this winter. The Keewatin Lumber Co., of Keewatin, Unt., will get out about $4.00,600$ feel during the win:er.
