FUTURE OF SAINT JOHN-DIGBY FERRY IN LIGHT OF FREIGHT RATE INCREASES

Mr. J. P. Nowlan (Annapolis Valley): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Transport with reference to the specific freight rate increases involving the Saint John-Digby ferry.
